

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SHOWBOATS DESIGN AWARDS


oat International Media recently announced the finalists for the 2011 ShowBoats Design Awards and CNI is delighted to report that a number of its yachts made it through to the final round.

CNI finalists include the 56m (187'3) Panthalassa for the Interior Design Award — Sailing Yachts category; the 55.05m (180'7) Kahalani and the 45.6m (150'1) Illusion, both of which are in the Interior Design Award Displacement 30m-59.99m (98'-196'8) category; the 42.48m (138'8) Calliope in both the Interior Design Motoryacht Semi Displacement category and the Exterior Design & Styling Award for Motoryachts category, as well as the Naval Architecture Award for Motoryachts category, for which Kahalani has also been nominated as a finalist; and the 43m (141') Clear Eyes in the Naval Architecture Award Sailing Yachts category.

The winners will be announced — along with the Young Designer of the Year finalist, sponsored by CNI — on the 25 October at the Showboats Design Awards ceremony, which will take place at the Mar-a-Lago Club, Palm Beach, Florida.

LORO PIANA SUPERYACHT REGATTA 2011

NI once again sponsored the Loro
Piana Superyacht Regatta in
Sardinia this summer. The event, which is
attended by owners, is hosted each year by
the Yacht Club Costa Smeralda and Boat
International Media, along with main
sponsors Loro Piana.

Due to strong winds of 30 knots plus, racing only took place on two of the four days. Victorious in the Performance Division was Highland Fling: Irvine Laidlaw's world-

class yacht. Highland Fling also took the event's overall prize, The Silver Jubilee Cup.

In the Cruising Division, Harry Macklowe sailed Unfurled to victory — further enhaching the impressive track record of this fantastic racing yacht.

Next year's event is due to take place in early June, while its sister event will be held in Virgin Gorda in the Caribbean next March, so racing fans should ensure both events are in their diary for 2012.



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A TRIO OF NEW DELIVERIES

This summer saw the successful delivery of one of the largest yachts ever to have been built. The highly anticipated Serene is an impressive 134 metres (439') in length, making her one of the world's top ten largest yachts.

Built by Fincantieri, this motoryacht is the first ever of its size to be constructed by the shipyard's team. The colossal deal of Serene's construction, which took four years to complete, was brokered by the late Nicholas Baker. Serene has been finished to the highest standards, with each of her seven decks seamlessly combining sophistication with technology. Her striking features include a helicopter hangar, an indoor swimming pool, a beach club, two outdoor retractable cinema screens and an underwater observation room.

Her vast interior space was designed by Pascale Reymond from Reymond Langton Design, one of the most famous designers in the yachting industry.

The new 45.24m (148') displacement motoryacht Follow Me V was also delivered this July. Built by Spanish shipyard Factoria Naval Marín, this project was managed from concept to completion by CNI Palma broker Arne Ploch for a repeat client.

Ploch was responsible for the choice of designer and shipyard, interior distribution, features and design. The resulting build is a high-quality displacement yacht with stunning sleek lines, a steel hull, aluminium superstructure and a modern classic interior.

The new 40m (128') Tri-deck from CRN 5-G is another yacht that recently took to the high seas and has been enjoyed by her new owner in the Mediterranean through the latter part of the summer.

CNI London broker Simon Goldsworthy announced the successful delivery of the CRN 128, which is Hull #6 of the series and capable of speeds of up to 24 knots. With accommodation for 12 guests in five cabins, the yacht was delivered to MCA-compliance, so she can charter if desired.

BOAT SHOW SEASON

FESTIVAL DE LA PLAISANCE DE CANNES

The port of Cannes was once again busy in early September hosting its annual international yacht show. CNI exhibited eight spectacular yachts during the week, including one of the finest examples of the Heesen series, the 44m (144'4) My Petra. 



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On board Michael Foster Top Times)

The captain of the 34.47m (113') Top Times recalls fond memories of life at sea and offers cruising tips for Caribbean charters

FOSTER ON... HIS BACKGROUND

I began my career at sea running dive charters around the Caribbean's Grand Cayman and Turks and Caicos islands in the late 1990s. But I soon needed more of a challenge, so I hung up my wetsuit, upgraded my licence and landed my first job on the 45m (148') Feadship Lady Sheridan. During four incredible years we travelled from Maine to Tobago, and crossed the Atlantic six times from Costa Rica to Croatia. This first experience of life at sea had me hooked and I went on to work on the 43m (142') Positive Carry, the 56m (184') Allegro and the 47.5m (156') Sea Racer, before joining Top Times.

FOSTER ON...TRAVEL

Among my favourite cruising grounds are the Amalfi Coast, Croatia, the Chesapeake Bay area, St Vincent and the Grenadines and New England. The Bahamas always captivates me because it presents something new, undiscovered and enchanting with each trip. My favourite charter expeditions there include a slow tender ride through the mangroves of Shroud Cay, snorkelling in the Sea Aquarium off O'Brien's Cay, and watching the falling tide recede on the flats at Sampson Cay. On the rare occasions I get to relax ashore with my wife and children, my favourite hangouts are my back garden and the beach. The one region I would most like to cruise around is the South Pacific, particularly New Zealand and Australia.

FOSTER ON... BEING A CAPTAIN

I have had a few challenging charters over the course of my career, both as a younger crew member and as a captain. Some charters were definitely more memorable than others, but I cannot recall any clients walking off the boat unhappy or reporting that they had less than an amazing time. It's all about having fun and relaxing with a little spontaneity and adventure thrown in to make sure everyone is on their toes.

The most challenging part of my job is also what keeps me interested in it — and fit. When we're not chartering we run the boat with just three crew, so the mate and I divide our time between engineering tasks, being on deck and managing the bridge. It amazes me how all the work gets done.

FOSTER ON... TOP TIMES

Top Times is a pleasure to work aboard. She is a classic, American-built yacht that impresses guests the moment they set foot inside her warm, inviting interior. We run an exciting programme that keeps things fun and interesting for the guests and crew. Our coolest toy at the moment is the 4m (14') Com-Pac picnic sailboat. It is always popular and is a great way to genuinely escape the whole world and relax.

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Taste notes with...

Patrick Roney Charter cuisine

Patrick Roney, chef on board the 40.23m (131'9) Monte Carlo, talks crab cakes, culinary shows and Michelin stars

aving always been passionate about food and determined to pursue a career in the industry, I trained at The Culinary Institute of America in Hyde Park, New York, back in 1997. Since then I've had an incredible journey — quite literally since 2002 when I first started working on yachts as I've had the opportunity to explore the world while I work.

"Food and travel are great companions. They're both a wonderful way to broaden your horizons and meet people, and cooking for new friends and guests is one of the highlights of my job. Of course, being a chef on a yacht requires a certain mindset. You can't go home after a hard day — you live where you work and your colleagues are also your room mates. This doesn't suit everyone, particularly as some crew are fussy eaters, and of course you have to cater for them as well as the guests. Missing family and friends from home is also a consideration. I'm fortunate because my wife works on board Monte Carlo, so my family travels with me. As an added bonus, you really can't beat the novelty of having a great new view through your 'office' window every day.

"Before I took my career to sea I worked in restaurants in the US. I spent my formative years at One Market Restaurant and the Campton Place Restaurant, both in San Francisco, and following that I was executive chef at an organic fine-dining restaurant called the Flea Street Café in Palo Alto, California.

"Over the years I've evolved my style; I would say my speciality is New American with global influences. I grew up in Maryland, US, so I'd probably vote crab cakes as my ultimate signature dish, but I try to add my own unique twist to everything I cook.

"People always ask what inspires me after years in the industry and the answer is really simple: exceptional ingredients, from freshly caught fish to something as simple as a perfectly ripe tomato. I'm also inspired by adventurous diners who challenge my skills, and I regularly look to the great names in the industry for innovation: Eric Ripert at Le Bernardin in New York, David Kinch and George Morrone all come to mind. As far as restaurants are concerned, in the US my favourites include Manresa (Los Gatos, California), The Restaurant at Meadowood (Napa Valley, California), Sidecar (Brooklyn, New York) and Eleven Madison Park (Manhattan). In Europe, you can't top L'Atelier de Joël Robuchon (Paris, France).

"I also enjoy participating in cooking competitions. One I recall with particularly fond memories is The Pebble Beach Food & Wine Show in 2009. It's the West Coast of America's premier epicurean luxury lifestyle event featuring 100 world-class chefs and attracting around 7,000 visitors. The year I participated, I got to work alongside culinary rock stars, the likes of Eric Ripert and David Kinch, while assisting in cooking and plating for several events,

including a Cristal Champagne dinner. There were 120 magnums of vintage Cristal and each of the seven courses of food were paired with seven vintages of Cristal.

"I love being at sea, but ultimately my plan is to return ashore, open my own restaurant and earn a Michelin star... or two."

[SERVES 4] CRAB CAKES

3 egg yolks

30z mayonnaise

2tbsp Dijon mustard

2tbsp Old Bay seasoning

Juice of 1 lemon

Salt and pepper

Chopped chives

1 lb jumbo lump crab

1/2 cup Panko bread crumbs

1. Mix all the ingredients except the crab and panko crumbs. Then lightly fold these in too.

2. Press 40z portions of the mix into ring moulds and dust the top and bottom with bread crumbs.

3. Saute in butter on a medium heat

until golden brown on both sides. 4. Finish in a 350°F/180°C/Gas 4

Aioli

2 egg yolks

oven for 10 mins.

1tbsp Dijon mustard

2 cloves garlic

Juice of 1 lemon

1. Blend egg yolks, Dijon, garlic, lemon juice, salt and pepper and ice cubes in a food processor for 30 seconds. With the processor still on, drizzle both oils into the yolk mixture until it becomes thick and fluffy.

Blanch basil in boiling water for 30 seconds and shock in ice water.

3. Squeeze excess moisture from basil and whizz in a blender for 1 minute with the 20z olive oil. Strain and whisk into the aioli base.



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The seafront home of stately mansions, car-chase crazy hills and eclectic arts and culture, San Francisco is one of the US's most appealing West Coast cities

he vertiginous appeal of San Francisco has soared ever higher since the days of the Gold Rush. Despite its fortunes having risen and plummeted as dramatically as its trademark hills, it remains one of North America's best loved cities.

Variously home to the Beat Generation, the 'summer of love' hippies and dot-com entrepreneurs, this West Coast gem reflects an appealing mix of nationalities, cultures and qualities as a consequence of its rich history. This is a city that in 1906 was decimated by an earthquake. It later survived the Great Depression with a flourish, as it was during this time that the legendary Golden Gate Bridge, still one of the world's most famous and best-loved bridges, was opened in 1937 amid a week of celebrations.

Today, San Francisco honours its vibrant heritage and blends cosmopolitan and artistic culture with a charismatic, modern vibe. Its waterfront setting, in particular, highlights its laidback appeal, and the entire city is small enough to explore during a long weekend. Tour the museums, wander around Nob Hill with its rococo palaces recalling yesteryear's railroad and silver kings, dig into clam chowder, tune into the San Francisco Symphony, and toss a Frisbee in Dolores Park.

PILLOW TALK

Among the big players here, the likes of the Ritz Carlton, Four Seasons, Fairmont and Mandarin Oriental, is the St Regis in the

SOMA district, featuring a historic building and a new 40-storey tower offering incredible city views. Its choice location offers pleasing distractions, from the acclaimed San Francisco Museum of Modern Art alongside to the Yerba Buena Gardens opposite. The Clift, home of serious style, is worth a visit. It has an oldworld elegance thrown together with a Philippe Starck designed interior starring an eclectic collection of furniture and décor. It is located just by Union Square and Nob Hill, so rest assured you'll be among good company.

At the base of the Golden Gate Bridge is **Cavallo Point**, which offers a pleasing mix of historic lodgings and contemporary hotel rooms. For historical appeal, stay in the former officers' residences of Fort Baker (once a US Army post) where family suites are luxuriously appointed yet homely. Alternatively, more modern rooms and suites can be found on the hillside above the Fort where they afford incredible views of the Golden Gate Bridge and San Francisco Bay.

The Huntington Hotel on Nob Hill has crowned one of the city's highest perches since

1924 and



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still remains a great favourite thanks to its impressive location, rich history and endearingly elegant private-home ambiance.

EAT, DRINK, DANCE

With over 3,000 choices, it's no wonder San Francisco is known as the US's finest restaurant city. **Perbacco Ristorante and Bar** is a classy Italian with a touch of Provence thrown in. Try the chef's table to sample the finest food fresh from the local Farmer's Market. The Michelin-starred **One Market** at the San Francisco Embarcadero provides a benchmark for sophisticated dining, while Japanese lovers should try **Bushi-tei**, where a blend of Asian and French influences result in pure art on a plate.

After-dinner hours are well spent at the Redwood Room at the Clift Hotel. Recently restored, it still has its original redwood panelling and enormous bar along with digital artwork on huge screens. Sip Bar & Lounge is a welcoming urban cocktail venue on Broadway Street. Fisherman's Wharf, meanwhile, has a range of eateries and bars in one scenic waterfront location. Its Parlor Bar, Lounge & Club is great for cocktails, music and yesteryear appeal. Harry Denton's Starlight Room at the Sir Francis Drake Hotel offers 1930s' glamour, cocktails and wraparound views. Order a VIP booth for a truly exclusive experience.

SEE, SHOP

Union Square is a vast shopping plaza with one of the largest collections of department stores, boutiques, galleries and

salons in the US — as such it's one of the world's most exciting places to shop. Union Square also refers to the neighbouring blocks that accommodate numerous hotels and the theatre district. Pier 39 is an entirely different kettle of fish. One of San Francisco's leading visitor attractions, it is a waterfront hub of shops, restaurants, nightlife and museums. Head to the wharf to savour award-winning clam chowder served in sourdough bread bowls, rent a bike to see the sights ashore, then hop on a sportfishing boat for an afternoon in the bay. Don't leave without seeing the sea lions that cluster around the west of the pier. For alternative colour and charm, the Farmer's Market at Ferry Building Marketplace is a must for gourmands on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

If you're limited for time, the Inner Richmond is a microcosm of the city with its vast urban parks, tree-lined streets, cuisine and shopping, embracing Thai, Korean, Russian, Japanese, Irish and Chinese cultures. Museums and galleries to visit include the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art (SFMOMA) and the California Academy of Sciences with its aquarium, rainforest and natural history museum.

DO, DISCOVER

Top of the list has to be crossing the **Golden Gate Bridge**. You can walk or cycle across this mammoth of acclaimed engineering and have your photo taken on one of the most photographed objects on Earth. The cable cars have been



ploughing up and down the city's trademark hills since 1873 and demand a ride. You'll hear their iconic bells clanging from blocks away, and they promise a great view of the city.

Chinatown, as in most countries, is a colourful city within a city, with its heart occupying the oldest street in San Francisco: **Grant Avenue**. Marvel at all the exotic shops, markets, temples and herb shops and treat yourself to fortune cookies for the ride back to your hotel.

Journey to the middle of San Francisco Bay to discover the intriguing island of Alcatraz and its infamous former prison, from which no inmate ever escaped. The stories have fuelled books, films and legends, so see 'The Rock' for yourself with a cell-house tour. If you have a morning free, head to the Italian quarter at North Beach (confusingly, not a beach at all) and wander the cafés and shops before making your way to the Church of Saints Peter and Paul, and the Coit Tower on Telegraph Hill, where you'll enjoy a great photo-opp of the bridges and bay. The 1,000-acre Golden Gate Park is also a great day out with its gardens, carousel, lakes, 4,000 species of trees, and museums - including the city's oldest: the $\ensuremath{\text{de}}$ Young Museum, which is showing masterpieces from Picasso until October this year. The Mission is also a charismatic neighbourhood for arts and culture with its medley of streets full of food vendors, galleries and theatres. Buy yourself a treat at the Tartine Bakery and walk to Dolores Park to enjoy it while watching the world go by.

SUSSIE KIDD, CNI ANTIBES

AUSTRALIA

When it comes to considering your next charter destination, Australia might not immediately spring to mind but for me it has unique appeal, particularly as it's my homeland. It's a country that offers a real sense of freedom and excitement. The unspoilt coastlines that surround it are stunning, as are its offshore waters, which are bursting with coral reefs and marine life. These reefs and the nearby beaches are a huge draw and you can visit some of the best of them during a cruise of the Whitsundays islands, which sprawl at the heart of the Great Barrier Reef.

But the vast distances between the country's highlights mean you need to plan in advance. Take advantage of the land-based culture and diversity by spending a couple of days in Sydney or Melbourne before joining your yacht. Also try to head inland to the outback areas, which are brimming with Aboriginal heritage. Wherever you choose, you'll be amazed by the variety of attractions this vibrant cruising ground offers.

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THE EXPERTS

cruising destinations

DIANA LEE MARES, CNI PALM BEACH

GRENADINES

The Grenadine Islands in the Caribbean are a fantastic playground for charterers, and with so many isles waiting to be explored the region is especially suitable for active guests. Vast reefs, the most impressive of which can be found at Tobago Cays, offer fantastic snorkelling, and the clear waters are perfect for swimming and watersports. Visitors wishing to explore the islands can either hike or hop on a horse — both are wonderful ways to see the exotic plants and trees that thrive in these beautiful landscapes.

Those seeking pure relaxation and postcard-perfect beaches should head straight for Palm Island, where they'll find Casuarina with its unbelievable white sand beaches. Food throughout the Grenadines is generally highly regarded and reflects a variety of cuisines, from local Caribbean dishes to more continental fusion style. I highly recommend booking a table at Firefly on Mustique, where you can indulge in classic American dishes with a Caribbean twist.

TANDY DEMARCHELIER, CNI ANTIBES

ST BARTH'S

For me, the best island in the Caribbean is St Barth's. It has all the offerings of other top cruising destinations — blue skies, white beaches, clear waters — but what really sets it apart is its relaxed, friendly atmosphere. It is perfect for those who want to enjoy a slower pace as life here isn't taken too seriously; in fact, the only thing that appears to be a concern is looking after the island's guests.

You'll find the food is creative and delicious, with fresh-fish dishes gracing many a restaurant menu. There are also plenty of bars in which you can sit back and absorb the island's relaxed vibe. My favourite is the Pink Parrot (see page 43) as it serves a mouth-watering rum punch and provides the perfect platform from which to catch a magical Caribbean sunset. The water here also lends itself to idle cruising and it is crystal clear, so fantastic for snorkelling and diving, plus there's plenty of space to tear around on watertoys.

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cattered over 100,000 square miles of iridescent blue shoal waters, more than 700 Bahamian islands and cays lie in a gentle east-west curve just 50 miles south of the US coast of Florida. Most of the cays are deserted and surrounded by unspoilt reefs, shallow fishing waters and a plethora of dive sites, while a handful are inhabited. From the cosmopolitan capital of Nassau to the quaint, laid-back Exumas and the shallow waters of the Abacos, the Bahamas offers high style with Bohemian living.

Begin your charter in Nassau, before sailing off to the 100mile string of pristine cays known as the Exumas lying to the southeast of Nassau. For those on a longer charter, Harbour Island, to the east of Nassau, and the Abacos further north are also prime cruising grounds.

Sun-drenched sands

New Providence Island and Paradise Island are bustling neighbours with vibrant nightlifes and an abundance of duty free shops, casinos and restaurants. Board your yacht in the world-class Atlantis Marina on Paradise Island and relax into life aboard as you begin your cruise towards the Exumas. Over the next few days your yacht will glide from idyll to idyll as you chill out on board, snorkel, dive, swim, fish and play with the numerous watertoys.

First stop is Allan's Cay, which is a haven of calm. The three islets that make up this cay have a perfect anchorage at their centre, so take the tender from here to Leaf Cay and feed bananas to the local family of wild iguanas before returning for your first evening

on board. On the second day you will discover Compass Cay, a natural paradise of 450 acres with 15 beaches to explore, the most spectacular being the long Crescent Ocean Beach. For a unique marine adventure, throw hot dogs to the nurse sharks that swim around the shallow waters and then dive in to swim with these incredible creatures. The less adventurous can step ashore and discover the many scenic trails, or go with the crew by tender to bonefish in the shallow creek meandering up the centre of the island. Spend the evening berthed in Compass Cay Marina and take the tender around to the spectacular horseshoe beach on the east side. While the crew set up a sunset picnic, relax in the islet's natural Jacuzzi known as Rachel's Bubblebath. The deep,

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crystal-clear lagoon on the northwest of the island is one of the finest swimming holes in the Caribbean.

From Compass Cay, take the tender to the mangrove-edged archipelago known as Shroud Cay. Snorkel through the crystal-clear creeks that connect the islands for a view of the sanctuary fish, or if you manage to catch high tide this is the place to try the famous Mangrove Run aboard a jet ski. At the end of the run there is a hill you can climb to enjoy spectacular views over the surrounding cays. While you're there you can also take a moment to inspect all the mementoes that have been left by yachties who have previously visited this now-famous spot.

Back on board, cruise on to the baby-soft sand beaches of Staniel Cay for a cold margarita before diving in to discover the Thunderball Grotto of James Bond fame. The grotto is a hollowed-out island and, tides permitting, you can jump in and feed the plethora of colourful fish, including a number of stingrays, as you swim and snorkel through the water. Later, take an air tour of the island, or feed the wild swimming pigs on Big Major's Beach. Spend the evening ashore at the Staniel Cay Yacht Club for a rum punch and conch fritters.

Your yacht can then deliver you back up the chain to a protected anchorage off Big Major's Spot, ideal for waterskiing and other watersports. From here, anchor off Warderick Wells Cay, one of a cluster of islands that make up the Exuma Land and Sea Park. Often referred to as the Garden of Eden, this natural marine preserve is home to brilliant coral reefs and exotic marine life. For the non-divers in your party, there are many species of tropical birds to be spotted on the islets and

cays, or you can step ashore to Warderick Wells Cay and trek the numerous hiking trails dotted around the island. Still within the park, Hawksbill Cay is one of the most attractive spots in the Exuma chain and is well worth exploring.

From here it is a short hop to the popular yachting outpost of Highbourne Cay, which offers rolling hills, beautiful beaches, great snorkelling and diving. Directly off the cay is a drop off that faces the Exuma Sound — a vertical, 22-metre (75-foot) fall that is populated by all manner of sea life. Deep-sea fishing trips for mahi-mahi, wahoo, tuna and marlin can be arranged, so set off in the tender for an early morning adventure. Those left behind can berth among the spotted rays in the port of Highbourne Cay.

From here, return to Paradise Island for disembarkation, or for an extended itinerary head east to a handful of the Outer Islands, which include Harbour Island, Eleuthera, the Berry Islands and the Abacos.

The Outer Islands

Harbour Island is the place to find the pretty pastel-coloured houses and pink beaches that you so often see representing the Bahamas on postcards. It's also home to some of the best nightlife in this Caribbean group. Eleuthera is, like most of the Bahamas, ideal for snorkelling and diving. Particular hot spots include the Current Cut channel, the inland saltwater lake known as the Blue Hole, and the Train Wreck.

The Berry Islands can also be incorporated as part of an extended Abacos cruise from Nassau.



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The Abacos are a chain of islands located 185 miles north of the Exumas, and therefore most suitable for a two-week charter incorporating both island groups. This small, boomerang-shaped, archipelago, often referred to as the 'top of the Bahamas', is 130 miles long and is made up of Great Abaco, Little Abaco and a sprinkling of cays. The islands are a world apart from Nassau; a lazy spot where the pace of life drops almost to a standstill. There are no resort developments and no nightclubs (unless you count the weekly jump-up with music from local band The Hope Town Islanders), and bicycles and dinghies far outnumber cars.

The cruising grounds around this region have shallow waters and therefore are not suitable for yachts with deeper drafts, but that also means there is a distinct and welcome lack of cruise liners. However, for the right yachts, the Sea of Abaco offers sheltered cruising, protected from the wild Atlantic by a chain of barrier islands.

Cruise around the islands of Great Abaco and Little Abaco, and anchor off the many scenic cays that surround them. From the main town of March Harbour on Great Abaco, cruise across the Sea of Abaco to Elbow Cay and step ashore in Hope Town. There are just two narrow streets here, charmingly named 'Up Along' and 'Down Along', along with one of the most iconic landmarks in the Bahamas: a candy-striped lighthouse. This is also the place to head if you want to see the islands' famous clapboard-cute, pastel-coloured houses surrounded by white picket fences.

In the evening, take the tender to Cracker P's and join the locals at their legendary full-moon parties.

A short hop across the water is Man-O-War Cay. Step back in time on this island, which has a long tradition of boat building and is a pretty settlement for an afternoon stroll. Alternatively, divers in your group can explore inland blue holes, coral reefs and underwater gardens, along with marine preserves and ancient shipwrecks that abound to the east of the cays. Or stay above the water and join anglers from all over the world as you fish for blue marlin, kingfish, dolphinfish, yellowfin tuna, sailfish, amberjack, grouper and wahoo. Great Guana, which lies between Green Turtle and Man-O-War Cay, in particular should not to be missed if you're a fan of fishing.

Finally, cruise north to Treasure Cay off Great Abaco's east coast. Here you will find some of the best beaches in the Bahamas and one of the finest marinas in the entire region. The island also boasts a scenic 18-hole golf course at the Treasure Cay Golf Club.

After your crew has replenished the yacht's provisions, spend the afternoon at Green Turtle Cay. Often referred to as the jewel of the archipelago, the tiny island is surrounded by deep bays and vast stretches of beach. The interior is rich with forests, gentle hills and secluded inlets that can all be enjoyed during a short hike. Alternatively, the water depths around here seldom exceed 20 feet and coral gardens teem with marine life, making this a great spot for snorkelling.

You can fly directly to Nassau in the Bahamas from many US cities, including Miami, Fort Lauderdale and Palm Beach, as well as from many international destinations. For further information on chartering in the Bahamas, contact your CNI charter broker, see page 6



Key design trends of 2011

THE SQUARE COMES AROUND

fthis year's mammoth Baselworld watch fair is anything to go by, it is increasingly hip to be square — or at least to have a few sharp edges to your timepiece. Perhaps the most famous square model is the iconic TAG Heuer Monaco, as worn by the legendary Steve McQueen. Originally known as the Heuer Monaco, this piece was as groundbreaking as it was stylish as it was both the world's first automatic chronograph and the first chronograph in a square case. Recently rereleased, the TAG Heuer Monaco Heuer Calibre 11 Chronograph looks as good today as it did in the 1971 Le Mans film.




UPDATED ICONS

his year has seen a number of fresh updates to special originals, including the Royal Oak from Audemars Piguet. The watchmaker has made all manner of adaptations to its legendary Royal Oak since it was launched in 1972, but the new Offshore Grand Prix version is one of its most radical versions to date. It features a forged carbon case that won't scratch, chip or dent, and a 365-part chronograph movement. The carbon case ensures it is light on the wrist, and because of its resistance to salt spray, it is an ideal sailing watch. Just 1,750 versions are available, including 650 in rose gold and 75 in platinum.

MOVEMENTS ON DISPLAY

ften a watch's intricacies are concealed, but the last few years have seen ever increasing numbers of watchmakers revealing the horological mastery beneath skeletonised dials. Zenith's Open Power Reserve El Primero Chronomaster is one example that reveals the heart of the timepiece. It features a 42mm open case that presents the watch's movement. Another technical dimension to the piece is the heart of the movement, which has been displaced slightly to the ten o'clock position on the dial. The watch is available in steel or 18ct two-tone or rose gold, with a silver or black sun-burst dial and a brown or black alligator-leather strap.



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COMPLICATED COMPLICATIONS

rom jumping hours to patented moon phases to split-second chronographs, some of the most elaborate complications to date have been launched this year by master watchmakers. One such model comes from Harry Winston, which first launched the Histoire de Tourbillon collection in 2009. This year, for its second edition, the master has paid tribute to the undisputed star of complications with an exclusive new model issued in a limited series of 20 pieces. Featuring an ingenious construction that makes light of established conventions, the model includes a bi-axial flying tourbillon. All the displays are isolated in independent offset sub-dials, with running seconds at nine o'clock, minutes at six o'clock, and hours with day/night indication at two o'clock. The case is partitioned in different levels, with eight sapphire crystals punctuating the glass. The white-gold structure measures 48.5mm in diameter. Powered by a mechanical, hand-wound movement exclusively developed for Harry Winston, Histoire de Tourbillon 2 showcases a supreme complication in a setting worthy of this watchmaker's stature.

Another elaborate piece comes from TAG Heuer. The first and only mechanical wrist watch to display time to an accuracy of one-thousandth of a second, the *Mikrotimer Flying 1000* from TAG Heuer uses an ultra-high frequency spring to vibrate at 3,600,000 beats per hour, 125 times faster than most chronometers. It uses two different power chains, one to drive the watch during normal operation and one to drive the motion needed for high-speed chronograph timing, and features a combination of hands and dials to provide a clear way to read the chronograph.

Not to be outdone, Patek Philippe's *Triple Complication (Ref 5208P)* is a remarkably complex timepiece, featuring a minute repeater, a monopusher chronograph, and an instantaneous perpetual calendar. The mechanical complexity of the watch necessitates over 700 individual parts — all of which are concealed beneath a characteristically elegant and understated dial.





IWC SPONSORS THE VOLVO OCEAN RACE TEAM

WC has signed up with the Abu Dhabi Tourism Authority to become the first major sponsor of its Volvo Ocean Race 2011/12 team: the Abu Dhabi Volvo Ocean Race Team. The 39,000 nautical mile round-the-world race begins this October in Alicante, Spain, and ends in Ireland in July 2012, with a total of nine stopovers, including Abu Dhabi in December/January. The race will cover six continents and four oceans.

IWC's CEO, Georges Kern, comments, "For more than 140 years, IWC has epitomised values such as engineering, excellence, perfection, pioneering spirit, quality and passion. We are proud to put these attributes to the test as the Official Timekeeper of the forthcoming Volvo Ocean Race, and to share them with the Abu Dhabi Volvo Ocean Race Team."

Ocean coint

he worlds beneath and above the surface of the ocean have long attracted watchmakers. This has resulted in dive watches being designed to plunge to great depths—the likes of Rolex's Submariner, Omega's Seamaster, Blancpain's Fifty Fathoms and Panerai's Radimor—as well as ocean-going regatta special editions (such as Corum's Admirals Cup, the IWC

Portuguese Yacht Club, the Hermès Clipper, and the Breitling Superocean). In the past, almost every brand has jumped on board to add yet another bigger and better piece to its collections, but in 2011 it seems the trend has become more discreet as today we are seeing a return to slimmer, scaled-down timepieces.

KEY TRENDS FOR 2011

This year, ocean-going timepieces were abundant at both the Salon International de la Haute Horlogerie in Geneva, Switzerland, and at the Baselworld watch show.

Time & Tide selects ten models inspired by the sea



CLASSIQUE HORA MUNDI, BREGUET

Breguet's Classique Hora Mundi has the ability to flit between two time zones. It is available in three different models that feature outlines of the Asian, European and American continents. Set it to your chosen two time zones and the hands will alternate to display the time in either region. The watch also synchronises the date and the day and night indicator, and will display a named city from a choice of 24. The 44mm case is made of 18-carat red gold with a hand-engraved case-back, and the watch has an alligator-leather strap.

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AVENGER SEAWOLF CHRONO BLACKSTEEL, BREITLING

The Breitling Avenger Seawolf Chrono Blacksteel is designed to be used in and around the sea. Water-resistant to more than 900m (3,000ft), the timepiece has magnetic push pieces that enable the chronograph function to be used under water. It is available in a black, carbon-based finish with a black face and luminescent hands and hour markers. There is also a wind rose marked on the bezel for basic navigation.

CHRONOMAT GMT, BREITLING

The latest version of Breitling's iconic aviation watch is the *Chronomat GMT*, which features a chronograph and the ability to move easily between two time zones — simply pull out the crown and turn it forwards or backwards as required. This sizeable watch has a 47mm case, 47 jewels, sapphire crystal and a 70-hour power reserve.





500 FATHOMS GMT, BLANCPAIN

Blancpain's love affair with the water continued at this year's Basel show with a demonstration of the beefed-up underwater legend Fifty Fathoms. The latest, limited edition 500 Fathoms GMT is guaranteed to be waterproof to over 900m (3,000ft), and features a second time-zone indicator. Its nautical credentials are further enhanced by the automatic winding rotor in the shape of a propeller, and a strap made from sail canvas.

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IWC PORTUGUESE YACHT CLUB CHRONOGRAPH. IWC

The Portuguese Yacht Club Chronograph is one of the most famous sailing-inspired watches. Reviewed in last year's *Time & Tide*, the piece was originally produced in 1939 and was the brand's most successful watch through the 1960s and 70s. Today, IWC has revived the Yacht Club model, and the 45.4mm *Portuguese Yacht Club Chronograph* is available in steel or rose gold, with a rubber strap.



YACHMASTER II, ROLEX

This year at Basel, Rolex announced an update to one of its most famous brands: the Yachmaster. The Rolex *Yachtmaster II*, in a mixture of steel and yellow gold, is an elegant upgrade to an earlier design classic and is now the largest Rolex the company makes, sporting a 44mm case. It also features a timer for regattas — a chronometer function that allows you to countdown as you get into position for the start of the race.

MAXI MARINE DIVER, ULYSSE NARDIN

Ulysse Nardin is famous for its marine chronometers and its passion for high precision chronometers carries through to its wristwatches, which often have a nautical theme. One of the latest is the *Diver Black Surf*. Guaranteed water-resistant to around 200m (650ft), this limited-edition piece has a rose-gold case fitted with rubber strap that is available with either rose-gold or ceramic links.



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RADIOMIR REGATTA 1/4 SECOND, PANERAI

One cannot talk about ocean-going watches without including the *Panerai Radiomir Regatta*. Every year Officine Panerai creates a Special Edition piece for the Panerai Classic Yachts Challenge. Designed for the 2010 Challenge (just 500 pieces were made) the chronograph is precise to an eighth of a second. Ideal for regatta racing, the watch can time two simultaneous events, and features a scale for calculating speed in knots. Available in brushed titanium with a fine polished bezel, the 47mm case is watertight to 10 bars.

LUMINOR SUBMERSIBLE 1950 REGATTA 3 DAYS GMT AUTOMATIC TITANIO — 47MM, PANERAI

For the 2011 edition of the circuit, Officine Panerai created the *Luminor Submersible 1950 Regatta 3 Days GMT Automatic Titanio*— 47mm, a professional diver's watch, water-resistant to 30 atmospheres (about 300m/1,000ft), and fitted with a rotating bezel with a graduated scale for calculating the time in a second time zone. The solid case is made of brushed titanium, and the rotating bezel carries raised dot-shaped titanium markers and black line markings. The blue dial is simple and classic, coated with SuperLumiNova to ensure maximum visibility underwater. As with the 2010 Panerai Radiomir Regatta (see opposite page), the Luminor Submersible 1950 Regatta 3 Days GMT Automatic Titanio is available in a limited edition of just 500 pieces.





ADMIRAL'S CUP BLACK HULL AND THE ADMIRAL'S CUP SEAFENDER 46 CHRONO DIVE, CORUM

A popular piece in the nautical world since it was first launched in the 6os, Corum's Admiral's Cup is instantly recognisable with its large, 12-sided case and naval pennants on the dial. The latest addition to the collection was available in a number of different themes, including the *Black Hull 48 Diamond Chronograph*, of which just ten were made and have now been sold.

Corum has also released the *Admiral's Cup Seafender 46 Chrono Dive* (pictured left). The model introduces the chronograph into the range. Water-resistant to over 270m (90oft) and topped by a 120-toothed unidirectional bezel, the model is made from grade 5 titanium. Its dial is surrounded by an inner bezel ring with the 12 nautical pennants that have contributed to the collection's reputation.



ROYAL OAK OFFSHORE, AUDEMARS PIGUET Audemars Piguet's Royal Oak Offshore has to be the ultimate playboy watch — perfect for wearing ashore in St Tropez or joining the yachting crowd on Pampelonne Beach. The



SEA DWELLER, ROLEX

The Sea Dweller by Rolex has to be one of the ultimate beach watches. Produced in 2008 for the 50th anniversary of the Italian State Police Divers Unit, so naturally water-resistant, only 78 pieces were made, making it one of the rarest pieces Rolex has ever produced.

FORMULA 1, TAG HEUER

This is the workhorse of the watch world. Looks great, lasts forever and is great value. One of the most popular watches on the market, Tag Heuer's Formula 1 has been released this year in a number of new editions, including military colours, the *Calibre S Chronograph* (pictured), the *Grande Date Watch Gulf Edition*, and the *Orange Indexes*.





Ladies timesieces

ecent collections have seen more and more precious gems finding their way into the finest timepieces. This year saw several brands introducing a new generation of ladies' watches that combine elegance with technical advancement. Some of the trends that have been successful to date are simply evolutions of existing models, others are new, but one thing that stands out is that the complications seem to be getting more and more complex every year.

JEWELS THAT TELL TIME

Ladies timepieces were once just a piece of fine jewellery, but today's collections show that the technology behind the intricate designs is as impressive as the variety of precious stones they boast. The *Rosebud* by Harry Winston is one such example. At its centre is a diamond surrounded by a corolla of pear-cut diamonds that pivot to reveal a mother-of-pearl dial.

Van Cleef & Arpels High Jewellery timepieces are fine pieces of jewellery set with diamonds, rubies, sapphires and emeralds. Part of the Van Cleef & Arpels collection that has been a speciality of the house since the 1920s, the latest in the offing is the High Jewellery Timepiece makis décor, which closes the brand's voyage into the jungle. The elegant design of the white-gold jewellery bracelet is based on a jungle scene, with two wide-eyed cavorting makis monkeys clinging to looping foliage and exotic flowers made of diamonds, blue and white sapphires and onyx. The central flower is mobile and protects the mother-of-pearl dial and the case, which is white gold set with diamonds.



THE WHITE CHOICE

A number of collections include white this year, making it this year's go-to neutral colour. The new *Arceau Chrono Colors* collection from Hermès includes a white version with saddle stitching and soft, white Epsom calfskin straps to honour the company's tradition of leather craftsmanship. The three counters and date are harmoniously arranged on the dial framed by a 43mm-diameter steel case. The chronograph hands and the seconds at three o'clock discreetly display the signature Hermès orange.

The Cat's Eye collection from Girard-Perregaux marries feminine curves with precious mechanisms. This year the manufacture introduced a new facet to the collection that follows the Cat's Eye's form, but is housed in a gold case with an intricately worked dial in white mother of pearl. The date is illuminated by a halo, and the small second is situated at nine o'clock and enhanced by a ray motif on the dial. Each of the hour indexes is a precious stone, with numerals in gold wire.





DIAMONDS ARE FOREVER

Whether they're dressing up the cases, dials, buckles, straps or, in some cases, the entire watch, diamonds are a hot trend for a number of new collections

PIAGET'S LIMELIGHT TONNEAU

This sparkling new addition to the *Limelight Garden Party* collection features the watch masters 526P movement housed in a classic tonneau shape. Baguette-cut diamonds line the bezel, while a further 542 brilliant-cut 8ct diamonds are embedded into the onyx dial alongside white-gold counters.

RAYMOND WEIL WOMEN'S PARSIFAL IN 18CT YELLOW GOLD

Within the re-launched *Parsifal* collection from Raymond Weil are a number of ladies' timepieces, including the 18ct yellow-gold Parsifal. Equipped with date function and water-resistant to more than 90m (300ft), the steel and yellow-gold timepiece comes with a diamond casing and mother-of-pearl dial.

DE GRISOGONO'S BLACK FOREVER OCCHIO

de Grisogono is celebrating 15 years of the Black Diamond. The rare, high-quality black diamonds used in the model have become de Grisogono's emblem and have adorned the wrists of Hollywood elite on the red carpet. The latest model is the *Black Forever Occhio*. Limited to just five pieces, the model is 18ct white-gold with a matt black coating, and is set with 167 black diamonds. The titanium dial features Arabic numerals in silvered script and the hands are 18ct white gold. The strap is black alligator, with an 18ct matt-blackened white-gold buckle.

CHOPARD'S IMPERIALE FULL SET

The *Imperiale Full Set* is the first watch from Chopard to house a movement entirely developed and produced in the Fleurier Ebauches workshops. The piece beats at a frequency of 28,800 vibrations per hour while the barrel ensures a 60-hour power reserve. The 40mm case in 18ct white or rose gold is covered with diamonds, including diamond-set dials. A piece of genuine haute horlogerie and haute joaillerie.

LIMITED EDITIONS

Limited-edition and one-of-a-kind designs have never shone more brightly than they have in the 2011 collections. One that particularly stands out is the *Talisman Suntime Riviera* from De Beers. With such a name, this jewellery watch must have been designed with yachting in mind, although it is more suited to sundowners on deck than helming, with its 357 baguette-cut diamonds set in a white-gold case. Instead of conventional hands, the watch indicates the time with a pair of hour markers around the outside of the bezel. Just one has been made, so this really is an exclusive timepiece.



Under the High Patronage of HSH Prince Albert II of Monaco, 40 of the most prestigious Swiss watch manufacturers will auction exclusive timepieces for the fourth biennial of the Only Watch Auction this September

rganised by the Association Monégasque contre les Myopathies (AMM) the Only Watch auction collects funds to support long-term, in-depth research into Duchenne muscular dystrophy. The auction will take place on the 22 September during the Monaco Yacht Show. The collection has been showcased around the world prior to the Monaco event and the tour finishes with a two-day exhibition at the Monaco Yacht Show, culminating with the auction by Antiquorum Auctioneers, who will brandish the hammer at the Hotel Hermitage at 4pm on the 22 September.

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

The biblical landscapes and remarkable underwater worlds around and beyond the Gulf of Aqaba make for an unusual and enchanting charter at the northern tip of the Red Sea

atch the sunset over the Gulf of Aqaba at just the right moment and you get a gist of why the Red Sea is so aptly named. As the sun catches on the scarlet mountains towering either side of this ten-mile wide stretch of water, the sea simmers deep red with their reflection.

At the very heart of the world, the Red Sea promises an intriguing charter. It has the inviting waters, sandy beaches and

diving appeal of the Caribbean, along with the cultural and historical allure of the Mediterranean. There are near-deserted islands and fascinating offshore reefs to explore, calm bays for watersports and bustling markets as vibrant with local character as they are with exotic spices and jewels. Cruising from Aqaba in Jordan down the Gulf of Aqaba, which slithers between Egypt and Saudi Arabia, the route is edged with vast deserts and mountain land scapes, the climate remains favourable yearround, and the welcome of the locals is equally warm.

An ardent fan of the region's charms is Hani Jabsheh, owner of the 43m (141'8) Hana, launched in 2008 from the CRN yard in Italy. "At the time [of Hana's launch] we were familiar with Jordanian waters and the Gulf of Aqaba but we knew little about the cruising conditions," Jabsheh explains. "For the past two winters we have been able to explore on board Hana, and we have been very pleasantly surprised by what we've discovered."

Hana's winter berth is at the Tala Bay Marina in Aqaba — an ideal place to begin a cruise of the area. You can fly into King Hussein International Airport, just a few miles away, and stay at one of several five star hotels, including the Radisson Blu Tala Bay Resort or the Mövenpick Resort & Spa Tala Bay Aqaba. If you have time to extend your break a few days, many of the highlights •

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of Jordan are easily accessible by car. You can follow in the footsteps of Moses on Mount Nebo as you gaze towards Bethlehem and Jerusalem; visit Madaba, city of mosaics; speed over the haunting landscapes of Wadi Rum, where Lawrence of Arabia based his headquarters during the First World War; or discover the world-famous Petra — the lost city carved into rock by the Nabataeans more than 2,000 years ago. It is now a Unesco World Heritage site and one of the New Seven Wonders of the World.

Exploring the gulf

Hana awaits in Tala Bay Marina, from where you leave the historic shore-based wonders of Jordan behind and drift into the Gulf of Aqaba, flanked by Saudi Arabia to port and the Sinai Peninsula to starboard at the northern tip of the Red Sea. From here, there are numerous highlights to absorb en route as your cruise takes you southwards.

Nuweiba is one such attraction. This coastal town in the eastern region of the Sinai Peninsula of Egypt is thought to be the site where the ancient Israelites crossed the Red Sea in biblical times. Its beaches still remain a draw, so you can step ashore to sunbathe and have a leisurely cocktail at the Hilton Nuweiba Coral Resort, or arrange a day trip to Petra if you didn't visit this genuine wonder while in Aqaba. Alternatively, head to Saint Catherine's Monastery at the foot of Mount Sinai. Now a Unesco World Heritage Site, this is believed to be where God spoke to Moses from the burning bush. It also contains priceless works of art and a vast collection of magnificent manuscripts.

While enthusiasts of both culture and history will be in their element during this cruise, diving fans can spend days exploring the wonders beneath the waterline. Ras El Shetan (Devil's Head) is one of the best-known sites in the region, and is a place where you can encounter hard corals, octopus, puffer fish, moon groupers, lemon goby and the blue-green puller.

Ras Mamlach in the Abu Galum National Park is another highlight. The reef has a beautiful coral garden where barracuda, jackfish, groupers, striking rock formations, coral gardens, emperor fish, crocodile fish, turtles and puffer fish abound. Dive deep enough and moon-like formations will enchant you.

Also on your cruise route, the small town of Dahab, formerly a Bedouin fishing village, is one of the world's most respected diving areas — particularly thanks to its canyons and Blue Hole, where you can spot a wealth of unusual fish.

If you fancy a trip further south, many miles offshore are the Brother Islands (considered to be one of the top three shark-diving sites in the world). These two pinnacles of undersea rocks rise out of the Gulf about 60 miles offshore. Part of the Marine Park Islands National Park, they offer stunning wall diving, soft corals, gorgonians, tuna, barracuda, snappers, jack fish, hammerheads and even white-tip sharks. Wreck divers, meanwhile, should take advantage of the opportunity to delve down to see the 82m (270') Aida II, which sank in 1957, and the cargo ship Numidia, which sank in 1901. You can also explore what is arguably one of the best wreck dives in the world

nearer to Sharm El Sheikh — SS Thistlegorm, discovered in the fifties by Jacques Cousteau.

While divers explore the underwater world, the rest of your charter party can make the most of Hana's attributes. Accommodating 10 guests, she features a full-beam owner's stateroom on the main deck, complete with a private terrace and balcony. Other highlights include an on-board 'beach' area for the ultimate in private sunbathing, and a gym for more active guests. "Charters are a very relaxed affair," confirms her owner, who considers running into the locals and other divers one of the most appealing aspects of a cruise in this region. "As chaotic as the Egyptians are, they are some of the most hospitable and friendly people on earth. They have always genuinely welcomed us."

Venturing further from the Gulf of Aqaba, why not consider a stop at Zabargad island, about 75 miles south of Marsa Alam just north of the Sudanese border, where there is an international airport. The island is uninhabited and you'll most likely not see another boat for miles around. While not a classically pretty spot, it has a certain appeal.

"Zabargad is the farthest south we have ever been," says Jabsheh. "I could not believe the colours I saw in the ultra-clear water. I have been to the Caribbean and lazed around in its turquoise waters and soft sands, but this really was something else. On one cruise we took the tender and jet skis across to the lagoon for a day on the beach. It was bliss. The sand was like nothing I have ever experienced; the clear air and contrasting colours of the sea and land stunned the senses; the temperature of both the sea and air was perfect, and our picnic

— washed down with some delightful Domaines Ott rosé — was all one could ask for."

Towards the open sea


As Hana guides you down the Gulf, and further south towards the Tropic of Cancer, with regular stops for diving, swimming, picnics and trips ashore, you can appreciate the leisurely pace of life and will have plenty of time to lounge on the deck being waited on hand and foot while reading up on the history of this fascinating part of the world, or simply dozing in the sunshine.

One place you should allow to disturb your reverie is Nabq. Its coastline is fringed with mangrove forests, and its coral reefs are extraordinarily rich. Step ashore to explore the fascinating lagoons, or climb aboard a camel to venture into the desert. Ras Mohammed — a marine and terrestrial park surrounded by stunning, world-famous coral reefs — is also a beautiful spot to visit with more than 1,000 species of tropical fish.

Finally, your cruise can deliver you to the very southern tip of Sinai at Sharm El Sheikh, or nearby Naama Bay. Sharm is the place that made the Red Sea famous for diving, so you can squeeze in a final dive to see the remarkable corals, marine flora and fish, or simply relax on the white sandy beaches. Enjoy a final meal aboard Hana, before venturing ashore to sample the night-clubs and casinos in this lively region. The following day, your crew will transport you to the Sharm El Sheikh International Airport, leaving behind the natural, cultural and biblical wonders of the intriguing Gulf of Aqaba and the Red Sea.

George Nicholson established CNI on behalf of Camper and Nicholsons Ltd in 1961. After a few years taking a back seat in the company, he recently resumed a more active role. Here, he relives the past and predicts the future

What does your new role at CNI mean for you and the company?

The Rodriguez Group, which incorporates CNI, recently restructured its management in a manner better suited to a public company. I am happy to be on the CNI board and plan to help put in place a new management team. Times have changed and companies today need to be more proactive and geared to the modern business climate, as well as making the most of the internet. It's also crucial to keep a close eye on emerging countries, such as Brazil, Russia, India, China and other Asian markets. We will be looking at joint ventures and franchises, as well as wholly owned offices. CNI was the first yacht broker to have a website. We have lost some of our innovation since those days, but I anticipate we will soon be back at the top.

Is the industry completely different nowadays, or is there still a similar vibe?

I have seen many changes over the years. When we started in 1960 there were no private harbours and such 'superyachts' as there were (either built before the war or smaller warship conversions) were all in Cannes or Monaco. The old Roman port of Antibes was tiny and Monaco did not have its sea wall — it was a bad place to be in winter.

The industry is very different now. The number of superyachts is increasing all the time and the widespread, high-quality infrastructure is just about keeping pace with the number of yachts. One concern is the pressure on the infrastructure in the western Mediterranean, but with development in the eastern Mediterranean the load can be spread. This also applies to the Adriatic, where the new Porto Montenegro marina will have a big impact.

The vibe is still there. People are passionate about yachts. The increase in the number of large sail boats is nice to see; the notion that they are greener probably helps. Today's round-the-world racing is remarkable, and now that the America's Cup has switched to dramatic multihulls it's bound to widen the scope for really high-performance sailing.

The proliferation of large power boats is what has driven the business end of the large yacht industry. This is where most of the money is, in both building and charter. Since the early 1960s, when Jon Bannenberg was just about the only designer dragging yacht construction into the modern era, there has been a proliferation of talented designers. What is surprising is that in the power-boat world the interior architects are now better known than the naval architects. This is not so apparent in the sailing yacht world. The challenge lies in the ability of the top yards to design, build and deliver these ever-more sophisticated yachts, and to find highly talented subcontractors to deliver the requirements of the owners and their architects.

What is most surprising about the changes in the yachting world?

The number of megayachts is amazing. To be in the top hundred largest yachts today, a yacht has to be over 72.5m (238'): huge! The values are vast, too. Charter has truly come of age. Not just because of the quantity, quality and worldwide spread of yachts, but because of the professionalism of crew, which has improved dramatically. This has been driven by the highly competitive yacht charter industry and the mandatory crew qualifications that go with commercial yacht registration, such as MCA and ISM. I am quite sure that many yacht owners are far better served on their yachts than in their homes.

How do the best things about the industry 40 years ago compare with the best things today?

I like the old-fashioned word allure. Manners were different when we started out and it was possible to do deals on a handshake. Today we are surrounded by all types of legal advisors, even for the simplest tasks. I do not remember having to pass a brokerage deal or a new build contract through lawyers until the mid 1980s.

On-board luxury and safety have come on in leaps and bounds since the early post Second World War days but today's large yachts are not comparable with the classics of yesteryear. There is a lovely feel and 'allure' about classic yachts, and it's nice to know that these older boats are still good at sea even if the stabilizers fail. They were built to be dependable sea boats before stabilizers were invented.

In your opinion, what are the most groundbreaking yachts to have launched in the past 10 years?

I think the most significant advances in naval architecture and build techniques have been made in sailing yachts. The hulls, rigs and materials used in a wide variety of sailing yachts puts power-boat development in the shade. I

Maltese Falcon's rig is extraordinary. But will this rig be adopted by many others? That is surely the true test of success.

I thought that ECO would be ground-breaking, but the foil that kept her on an almost even fore and aft trim from zero to 35 knots has not been adopted by others. One still sees yachts with planing hulls with their bows up in the air pushing mountains of water in front of them and leaving tons of inefficiently burned fuel behind. I would enjoy a round-table discussion with leading designers, Espen Oeino and Philippe Briand, among many others, to hear their views on what they think has been truly ground-breaking.

CNI has long been at the top of its field - to what do you attribute its success?

It takes a long time to build a lasting brand. CNI can thank my ancestors for that. In spite of the trade unions being largely responsible for the closure of the big yacht-building yard in Southampton in 1975, the smaller historic Gosport yard kept going until about 2000. A lot of boats were produced and the quality was such that most are still afloat. The closure of the Southampton yard freed up CNI to place orders in other yards. The rest is history. When the Southampton yard closed we thought it would be prudent to have a sales office in London as the UK was, and still is, a major yacht-owning country. Our presence in Palma was the result of the Club de Mar being opened. This was the first private yacht harbour in Spain and was an immediate success. An office in Palma seemed a good fit. At the time few Spanish owners put their yachts under the Spanish flag. Our office helped buyers overcome these problems. Our US offices came later.

What memories from your yachting background stand out as being particularly special?

I had terrific times on ECO. Crossing the Atlantic using the gas turbine, and refuelling from our own bunkering tanker mid Atlantic was really special. So was sailing from Sydney to Hobart, and then on to Chile and the Antarctic on board Adix.

Signing the book at Cape Horn is also one of my most significant memories. With hindsight, winning the Burton Trophy in 3.6m (12') National Dinghies and crewing for my brother Peter in 1958 in awful weather in the UK, have to be among my top sailing achievements. My brother Peter is a brilliant helmsman. I think it was the thought of a nice hot bath followed by succulent roast grouse at the end of a day's sailing that kept us going for the week.

I was the founding commodore of the Gstaad Yacht Club (GYC) and am delighted to be involved with some exciting times ahead for the club. This year the GYC, together with the organisers of Les Voiles de St Tropez, are organising the Centenary Challenge. Out of the 30 or so yachts that have been identified as eligible, eight are Camper & Nicholsons builds. The GYC is also active in the 2012 sailing Olympics, and I hope that our Star boat, and Laser Radial, will make the Swiss team for the Olympics. Exciting times for our mountain yacht club.

I also sail a Tofinou 9.5m (31') when I'm on holiday in Greece. This is the perfect small boat — good as a single-hander or for four people; I love it.









Sailing yacht regattas pepper the globe and unite the yachting community. **Ellie Brade** reviews some of the key events to note on your calendar

o matter how big or how elaborate a motoryacht might be, there is one thing that sailing yacht owners have that motoryacht owners don't: regattas. Superyacht sailing regattas have increasingly gained in popularity over the years, featuring more and more frequently on the yacht owner's schedule. Little wonder as they are the ultimate way to enjoy a sailing yacht — racing against other like-minded owners in some of the most inspiring surroundings in the world.

The sailing yacht fraternity is known for its enthusiasm and sense of community. These qualities come to the fore

in regattas to create hugely enjoyable events with atmospheres that are second to none. sea&i reports on some of the best events worldwide.

BUCKET REGATTAS

The Bucket regattas celebrated their 25th anniversary this year, highlighting their continuing popularity. The St Barth's Bucket, hosted by the Caribbean island of St Barthélemy, welcomes record numbers to its fleet each year. In March 2011, the 25th anniversary event saw the biggest ever fleet of 40 yachts taking part. The small town of Gustavia was transformed into a racing village as







superyacht owners, their guests and crew members descended upon the island for three days of racing. St Barth's is not the only host of Bucket regattas; the sister regatta, the Newport Bucket, takes place annually in August in Newport, Rhode Island. Fun is the main item on the agenda and organisers are keen to stress that this will always remain the key focus. www.bucketregattas.com

LES VOILES DE 9T BARTH

Les Voiles de St Barth is also hosted from the idyllic island of St Barth's, and planning for the third edition — due to take place on 2 to 7 April, 2012 — is well under way. The 2011 event saw four days of racing, with 48 yachts participating across five classes. Notable participants in the 2011 event included Rambler, Sojana and Highland Breeze. Organisers are confident that the enjoyment of those who attended the 2011 event will guarantee similar success for next year's regatta.

PANERAI CLASSIC YACHTS CHALLENGE

Antigua Classic Week is the first in a series of regattas that form the Panerai Classic Yacht Challenge. The regattas, which take place from mid April through to the end of September, take place on both sides of the Atlantic, from the Caribbean to the Mediterranean, the waters of the Solent (UK) and those of New England on the East Coast of the United States of America. The Challenge is the leading international regatta circuit reserved for classic and vintage yachts, and more than 500 classic sailboats are involved. www.panerai.com

LORO PIANA SUPERYACHT REGATTA

First held in 2008, the Loro Piano Superyacht Regatta, hosted by Boat International Media Group in collaboration with the Yacht Club Costa Smeralda and Loro Piana, opens the Mediterranean racing season. Hosted in Porto Cervo, Sardinia, the event follows a semi-pursuit format, with yachts

departing at three-minute intervals. Unlike the Bucket and Superyacht Cup events, handicaps are added after racing is complete. Five races over five days combine with a busy aprèsrace social schedule. www.loropianasuperyachtregatta.com

SUPERYACHT CUP

The Superyacht Cup team, part of The Informa Yacht Group, organises a series of regattas around the world for yachts of 26 metres (85 feet) and above. The fun regattas are raced

across two categories. Destinations for the event have included Palma de Mallorca and Antigua. Next year will see Superyacht Cup regattas in Palma on 20 to 23 June, and in Cowes, Isle of Wight, on 22 to 25 July. www.thesuperyachtcup.com

MILLENNIUM CUP

First held in 2000 (as one might guess from the name), the Millennium Cup, held off Auckland, New Zealand, is now an annual fixture and its organisers intend to make this the pre-



mier superyacht regatta in the South Pacific. The event features a variety of harbour and passage races. Motoryachts are also welcome, with the schedule including a motoryacht race around a set course. The 2012 edition of the Millennium Cup, held from 15 to 18 February, will conveniently tie in with Auckland's Volvo Ocean Race Stopover from 8 to 18 March 2012. www.millenniumcup.com

THE 2012 REGATTA SERIES

Next year's busy regatta schedule will include a series of races in the UK, to coincide with the London Olympics. Events will kick off in May with the Rum Race, where participants take part in races from Falmouth in Antigua to Falmouth in the UK. This will be followed by the Westward Cup, held in Cowes, Isle of Wight, from 11 to 19 June. A J-Class regatta will then be hosted in Falmouth, UK from the 26 to 30 June, followed by the third edition of the Pendennis Cup, also in Falmouth, UK, from 2 to 7 July.

A second J-Class Regatta (www.superyachtuk.com) will be hosted in Cowes between the 16 and 21 July.

Other regattas worth a mention include a number of builder and designer-specific events. For example, The Dubois Cup (www.duboiscup.com) is a regatta for owners of Duboisdesigned yachts, and precedes the Loro Piana Superyacht Regatta, while the Perini Navi Cup (www.perininavi.it/it/perininavi-cup) is created exclusively for the Perini Navi fleet. The 2011 edition, held in September, will welcome 20 yachts from Perini's 50-strong fleet to participate in three days of racing. This year also saw the inaugural Nespresso Cup, a regatta designed for the Wally Yachts fleet.

This is just an overview of the many superyacht regattas around the world, but one thing is certain — the range of events means that there is a regatta for everyone.

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MARKET PLACE INTRODUCTION

The fourth edition of CNI's (super) Yachting Index, released in August, looks back at the year 2010. The Index reports positive market conditions and figures, which, for the most part, are heading back to the figures witnessed in 2007.

BROKERAGE AND CHARTER

The global superyacht industry was worth US\$13.63 billion in 2009 – the figure in 2010 stood at US\$15.12 billion, up by just under US\$1.5 billion. The main challenge in both the pre-owned sales market and the charter market continues to be the availability of yachts – the high inventory of the global fleet has increased by over 50% since 2007.

In 2010, 33% more superyachts were available for sale compared to the crisis times of 2008 and 2009. On the charter side of business, the number of units available continues to significantly increase as more owners look for revenue to support costs. As a result of this influx the charter market is currently operating under very competitive conditions.

NEW CONSTRUCTION

In 2009 there was a decrease of 18% in both the number of new superyachts, as well as the total length of all completed supery-

achts. While the number of new completions in 2010 was still down by 8.5% to 195 vessels, the total length of all completions was only down to 8,649m (28,375'). Italy remains the major force in superyacht construction with a 33% market share (based on total length of all completions). Interestingly, over the last four years the top five countries (Italy, Netherlands, Turkey, Germany and the United States) have been responsible for approximately 80% of all completions.

The Index also reports an increase of 27% in new orders, climbing from 90 new contracts in 2009 to 114 new contracts in 2010. Despite this increase it will not be sufficient for all shipyards in the industry to survive. In the past two years approximately 100 shipyards delivered new superyachts, and 57 shipyards in 2009 and 66 in 2010 signed these new orders. Even though times in the superyacht building industry have been difficult, many shipyards still have orders and the majority of shipyards that did go into liquidation have been taken over by

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financially stronger companies. Thanks to these acquisitions, money is still invested in shipyards and the construction of new superyachts. Although this is a positive sign, we are not out of the woods yet; with most of the pre-crisis contracts (contracts before mid-2008) delivered or on the verge of delivery, it is going to be a decisive period for shipyards without any new orders and without the financial capacity to start a project on speculation.

NEW MARKETS

This year the (super) Yachting Index also compared the regions from which superyacht owners hail, using data compiled by the Forbes Billionaires List. It is interesting to note that 25.4% of the world's billionaires come from Asia, while clients own only 4.5% of all superyachts delivered in the last three years from Asia. This leaves room for growth in the Asian market.

CONCLUSION AND OUTLOOK

The global superyacht business significantly increased in 2010. New build orders were up by 27%, and the pre-owned brokerage business saw a 24% increase in the number of yachts sold. This did, however, have a knock-on effect on the charter mar-

ket, which saw a decrease in charter bookings of 9% from 2009, due to the number of yachts available compared to demand.

There are now even more yachts on the high seas (5,742 yachts reported in 2010 which is a 51.9% increase over 2007 figures), and therefore almost all yachting services experience improved business performance in 2010, compared to 2009.

The trends and rules have changed and the market has learnt a great deal from the crisis. There are more superyachts available to purchase and therefore more choice for buyers; in 2007 only 27% of the superyacht fleet was available for sale, in 2010 this had risen to 32%.

Presuming the industry doesn't experience another crisis, though many threats still remain and the situation is still relatively unstable, we expect a decent increase in brokerage business, but not to the same levels as experienced in 2010. Charter business should, by all accounts, follow the same trend with the emerging markets coming progressively into yachting. New construction remains a difficult market to predict as there is such a varied choice of yachts available to purchase at reasonable prices. We will, no doubt, see some spectacular new orders making a big splash.

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ARMAND DE BRIGNAC: RATED THE NO. 1 CHAMPAGNE IN THE WORLD

his year, as you prepare to spend the holidays with the most important people in your life, what better way to celebrate than with the best Champagne in the world, Armand de Brignac.

Produced at the family's estate in Chigny-les-Roses, and restricted to only 50,000 bottles per year. Armand de Brignac is a cuvee de prestige - a Champagne of great distinction.

Armand de Brignac is produced using entirely traditional artisan methods and values. From the picking of Premier Cru and Grand Cru grapes to remuage (riddling), filling, and applying each pewter label on the opulent, paperless bottles, every process is done by hand. Only eight members of the Chateau staff are entrusted to carry out the production process. Jean-Jacques Cattier, whose family has owned vineyards in the Montagne de Reims terroir since 1763, oversees each step.

The crowning honor came when Fine Champagne rated Armand de Brignac No. 1 in the world in its annual blind-tasting of 1,000 of the world's best Champagnes. Here, Monsieur Cattier offers his insight on what makes Armand de Brignac so special.

Our family created the prestige cuvee Armand de Brignac to produce the finest possible Champagne with the strictest attention to detail.

In each outstanding vintage year, my son Alexandre and I visit the best vineyards in the three most famous terroirs of our La Marne region of Champagne: the Montagne de Reims, the Côte des Blancs, and the Vallée de la Marne.

Choosing from among villages all rated Premier Cru or Grand Cru, we select only the grapes whose character and quality will allow us to meet the requirements of this special cuvee.

At the winery, we press these grapes on a traditional Coquart device and retain only the top fraction of the first pressing, ensuring that we obtain the purest and most desirable juice. For Armand de Brignac, the pressing is blended with that of harvests of two prior outstanding vintages, each obtained by these same careful methods. The bottles are then aged for at least three years in our cellars - considered among the deepest in Champagne, and thus most conducive to a slow aging process. At the final stage of their aging, the bottles are each riddled by hand - a process seldom done today - and disgorged. The final touch is another unique one for Armand de Brignac: we use a liqueur de dosage aged in oaken casks from Burgundy to impart a subtle 'touch of soul' to the blend.

Of course, after going to all this work, the Champagne must be suitably presented. The Armand de Brignac bottle is unique in the world - an opaque gold vessel adorned with pewter labels - and the bottle certainly makes a statement, wherever it is found.
