

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


ST BARTHS BUCKET

CNI CONTINUES TO EXPAND ITS BROKERAGE DIVISION


The superyacht industry remained highly competitive in 2010, with several price reductions and just over 300 new central agency listings on the market. Sales picked up in the spring and slowed in the summer, but from September through to the end of the year the market was steady, particularly in Europe, in terms of the quantity of sales.

CNI's Jillian Montgomery comments, "There are enough yachts currently under offer to give real confidence for the year ahead. Predictions are that the market will return to the levels of 2004 to 2005, rather than the boom period of 2006 to 2008."

FYBA reports that the US market has seen a significant level of deals closing in the last four months; with such an optimistic start to the year the remainder of 2011 looks promising. CNI broker Michael Rafferty remarks about the US market, "We are seeing increased interest from buyers but it is still a battle to convert this into firm sales. People are still nervous about the economy. That said, good-quality, low-priced yachts are selling but buyers are certainly looking around for deals."

CNI broker Simon Goldsworthy believes, "There are still many buyers expecting unrealistic opportunities, and many are not willing to make an offer." Goldsworthy's advice for sellers would be to price their yacht realistically. "Yachts that are priced more than 5 to 10% above the competition do not receive interest from brokers and buyers ready to pounce on realistically priced yachts that they consider to be a good deal."

Thankfully, confidence has been regained in the newconstruction market, which picked up towards the end of last year following the autumn boat show season. When considering the new build market, Goldsworthy believes that, "Those that did venture into the new-build market in 2009 and 2010 achieved prices far below pre-crisis level and these buyers, in particular, should be sitting pretty by the time their yachts are delivered in 2014-15." Delivery dates



for popular models like the new 37m (121') Benetti Classic now extend to summer 2014, and although far from pre-crisis delivery times, this does in itself demonstrate a recovery of sorts. For larger custom yachts there are still a number of shipyards very keen to sign deals at low prices, although this is more true of the emerging shipyards and newer brands than the very established yards. There are also a few shipyards that have started building on spec again, and these builds will present great opportunities as they approach their cut-off dates for interior choices.

Peter McCarthy heads up CNI's Yacht Management Division in Europe. "From a yacht management perspective, the market is healthy," he confirms. "More and more owners, especially of larger yachts, recognise the benefits of good operational and administrative support provided by a stable and respected company such as CNI.

"Aside from the all-important matters of looking after guests and owners, managing their crew and maintaining the yacht, captains have to deal with a quagmire of complex regulations. These legalities continue to increase and I believe many captains welcome, and need, the support of a good management company to assist them."







aunched last summer, Calliope is an all-aluminium gentleman's yacht. Her owner, an experienced cruiser, already owned the 32m (105') flybridge cruiser Cassiopeia but his love of life at sea led him to desire a larger yacht with a more extensive range, greater exterior living space and two further staterooms. The resulting yacht is the striking Calliope, built by Holland Jachtbouw.

No expense has been spared on this 42.2m (138'8) yacht that has been tailor made to her owner's every wish, and thanks to his years of cruising experience his influence is evident in every detail.

A high specification and extreme comfort were prime objectives, and noise and vibration issues were afforded particular attention. As a consequence, the interior is subject to minimum movement only — a considerable achievement for an aluminium yacht — and noise levels are well below even the most stringent specified requirements.

Her naval architecture and exterior styling are the work of Langan Design Associates, and the Rhode Island based experts created clean, masculine lines with a traditional feel. Atop her distinctive blue hull, her three decks feature an integrated bridge that contributes to her sleek profile.

Calliope's interior reflects the architecture of a classic French château with its elegant curves, flowing lines, serene background and stylish loose furniture. The wood in the cabins is weathered limed oak featuring a beautiful warm patina, and large slabs of slate and oiled sleepers add a homely touch to the saloon. However, the most striking feature of the yacht is a pair of reverse spiral staircases connecting all three decks. At their base are four guest staterooms stretching off a circular lobby, while up on the main deck is the lower saloon and dining area, which can be divided with a *shoji* screen. A large sun deck with Jacuzzi and comfortable, casual seating adds to her appeal.

Having spent the first few weeks of her career cruising the fjords of Norway, this appealing yacht is now available for charters in the Mediterranean this summer and will be heading to the Caribbean for the winter season.



onbogic Glenn Shephard PGISSIG

SHEPHARD ON ... HIS BACKGROUND

My career at sea was inspired by an advert on a youth-hostel notice board in Rome back in the 1980s. I was backpacking around Europe at the time and I read that they needed crew on a classic 15.8m (52') Bristol Channel Pilot motorsailer. I was on board from Easter to Christmas and it was the best summer of my life — I was hooked on life at sea.

My first live-aboard position was on a 40m (131') motoryacht, but after one crossing and a Mediterranean season I quickly returned to sailboats. I worked on the motoryacht Emerald Isle and the sailing yachts Atmosphere, Mirabella V, and Mirabella III prior to my current position on Parsifal III.

SHEPHARD ON ... TRAVEL

Aside from my love of sailing, the opportunity to travel makes this job, in my opinion, one of the best in the world. There are countless destinations that I have come to love over the years. As far as cruising is concerned, my favourite grounds include the Bahamas, the BVIs, The Chesapeake, New England, Greece, Corsica and Sardinia.

When I head ashore for holidays, two of my favourite places are Switzerland, and Oahu in Hawaii. Two regions I haven't yet visited and that top my wish list are the South Pacific and New Zealand. If I had to pick one region in which to live for the rest of my life, it would be the Greek islands — I'd spend my days happily cruising around them in a small sailboat.

SHEPHARD ON... BEING A CAPTAIN

The yachting industry is changing all the time, but some things always stay the same — to succeed you need persistence, a thick skin and a positive attitude. It's also vital to listen to your crew, don't be afraid of a good idea just because

you didn't think of it first. And be prepared for two of your greatest challenges: never having enough time to do everything that needs doing — and the unexpected. I faced one occasion where, 30 minutes before the end of a Caribbean charter in St Maarten, the guests decided to extend their cruise by ten days and head to Miami, more than 1,600km (1,000 miles) away. We pulled out all the stops and had a wonderful time, including a detour to the Silver Bank to watch humpback whales just off the swim platform, it was incredible.

SHEPHARD ON ... PARSIFAL III

I am loving my time aboard Parsifal III. The crew are really amazing, and she has a fantastic open-plan interior with a lot of deck space. She also has some great water toys — current favourites are the 255hp Sea-Doo and the Seabobs. Parsifal III is probably pretty much my ultimate yacht on which to work; although ideally I'd create a larger captain's cabin. For my own cruising use, I'd opt for a Sun Odyssey 42 Deck Saloon.

Taste notes with... Gino Razzano charter cuisine

Drawing on his Italian heritage, the chef aboard the 51.8m (169'9) Sai Ram serves up Mediterranean treats to compliment the yacht's cruising itineraries

AUBERGINE AND CRAB TOWER

SERVES 4 3 medium aubergines 250g crab meat 100g cherry tomatoes 200g rocket Olive oil Fresh lemon juice A pinch of salt and pepper Celery or parsley to garnish

PREPARATION

Slice the aubergine and brown under the grill. Chop the cherry tomatoes and rocket and mix with the crab meat to form the salad mixture. Add the olive oil, lemon juice, salt and pepper to flavour according to your taste.

Building the Tower

Begin with a few slices of grilled aubergine followed by one spoonful of the crab salad mixture and continue this process four times to complete the aubergine and crab tower. Garnish with a piece of celery or parsley and a drizzle of olive oil around the tower.

hanks to 27 years' experience as a chef, not to mention his Italian heritage, Gino Razzano can offer guests something of a gourmet treat when chartering the 51.8m (169'9) Sai Ram. "I started studying to be a chef in high school, after which I worked in hotels and restaurants before moving on to cruise ships," he explains. "It all proved to be an excellent training ground, ultimately enabling me to take on any culinary challenge. Eight years ago I was looking for a new and unusual direction in which to steer my career, so when I was offered the opportunity to work on board a superyacht, it gave me a chance to put my skills into practice. The first superyacht I worked on was the 47m (154') Shanty, and one year later I joined Sai Ram."

ITALIAN FLAIR

Razzano hails from Naples in Italy so it is perhaps not surprising that his speciality is Mediterranean cuisine, which perfectly compliments Sai Ram's cruising grounds. However, his creative pride inspires him to experiment with all different styles and methods of cooking from around the world. "I am a creative person, so I like to combine different traditions; however my ultimate aim is always to honour the quality of all the products I use, so I avoid redundant flavouring, instead allowing the natural flavours of the foods to shine through."



Meeting guests requirements is a varied and welcome challenge. Precharter forms allow Razzano to get a fair insight into his guests' preferences before they arrive, but he sees the process of satisfying their every demand as a constant evolution, and likes to involve guests in day-to-day meal planning — proposing recipes and dishes to compliment the specific region in which they are cruising. Highly organised, he stocks up on all essential and staple foods pre-charter, then makes regular stops ashore during the cruise to find the freshest local treats to highlight each dish.

Having worked with countless chefs over nearly three decades, Razzano has plenty of inspiration from which to draw, and combines this hands-on experience with innovations he admires from Italian chef Gualtiero Marchesi and French legend Alain Ducasse. However, he admits: "My all-time favourite chef is my mother."

Razzano confesses a passion for dining in Michelin-starred restaurants. "It gives me the perfect opportunity to discover and study new techniques and flavours. I then take these ideas and experiment with them in my own kitchen," he explains. The result of blending all these key influences is a signature style unique to Razzano. Some of the speciality dishes that he serves on board Sai Ram include an octopus salad with celery and potato, and an aubergine and crab tower as starters, followed by a main of pappardelle with seabass and fennel seeds. To finish, a favourite dessert is his limoncello baba.







Travelling through nature (and back in time, as the tracks were laid in 1888), you can rattle along viewing lush forests, craggy mountains, scenic lakes and the picturesque coastline, stopping en route for a Sardinian lunch.

CAGLIARI

PORTO CERVO

he famous Piazzetta in Porto Cervo offers the island's most compelling nightlife options. Or party the day and night away at Nikki Beach at the Grand Hotel Porto Cervo.

The 34 mile (55 kilometre) stretch of Costa Smeralda coastline is one of the most desirable in the world, with its emerald waters, white sands and sympathetically designed buildings having been inspired by the Aga Khan in the 1960s. If you fancy dinner or lunch ashore, weave to gilded hotels the likes of the Hotel Cala di Volpe, Hotel Pitrizza, Hotel Romazzino and Cervo Hotel.

MEDITERRANEAN SEA

The ancient Roman Amphitheatre at Cagliari occupies a spectacular setting and is, today, still used for jazz concerts, international music events and theatrical shows. Forte Village Resort, just a few kilometres from Cagliari is a five-star beach-front resort with a tropical park and Thaermae del Forte Spa and wellness centre with one-of-a-kind thalassotherapy treatments. Adding to its attractions are 21 gourmet restaurants, more than ten pools, a waterfront lounge bar and shopping to parallel a European plaza.



heavenwards in an attempt to outreach the mountains behind them. In between, at the end of long streets edged with pavement cafés, designer boutiques and eclectic stores, strips of Pacific Ocean flash temptingly.

Named after the English sailor Captain George Vancouver, who landed here in 1792, Canada's third largest city currently ranks fourth in the world for highest quality of life — and after a few days here it's abundantly clear how it earned its place. This is where Greenpeace was established in the 1970s, and thanks to its natural beauty and celebration of the great outdoors the city offers excellent opportunities for hiking, biking, sailing and skiing — the latter of which won it the honour of hosting the 2010 Winter Olympics. But this is also a city for shopping, nightlife, culture and fine cuisine.


Vancouver is an ideal destination for a relaxed and inspired city visit on a Pacific Northwest cruise, or if you're heading up

to Alaska, but the region also lends itself to longer visits, which can embrace the nearby legendary ski resort of Whistler, or the spectacular Canadian Rockies.

PILLOW TALK

The **Pan Pacific** has one of Vancouver's finest views as it sits atop a pier overlooking the harbour, Coastal Mountain Range, Stanley Park and the city skyline. But scenic settings come aplenty in this city. The **Shangri-La** occupies the first 15 floors of the tallest building in Vancouver, and many of the rooms have private balconies and boast the largest bathrooms in the city, complete with televisions. The waterfront penthouse at the **Granville Island Hotel** is also loved for its wraparound balcony, Jacuzzi tub, fireplace and sky-lit glass and marble shower. Or wind your way through the waterfalls and gardens of Robson Square to the landmark, family-run **Wedgewood Hotel & Spa**. This award-winning boutique property has 83 rooms and suites

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that are filled with flowers, antiques and works of art. There are two floors of penthouse suites with garden patios and spainspired marble bathrooms. As always, the **Four Seasons Hotel** is perfectly located — just a block from famous Robson Street and minutes from Gastown and Stanley Park. Among many of its attractions is its split-level prime minister suite with living and dining area, two bathrooms and one- or two-bedroom configurations. The **Fairmont Hotel** is another five-star choice with a state-of-the-art health club, spa, designer boutiques and award-winning restaurants. For an old classic with new charm, the **Rosewood Hotel Georgia**, opening in May, blends the glamour of the 1920s with modern excellence (see page 28).

EAT, DRINK, DANCE

EAT... Vancouver is spoilt for choice when it comes to dining, including the two restaurants of Michelin-starred chef Daniel Boulud. Having earned three Michelin stars for Daniel, his New


York restaurant, Boulud brings his winning formula to Vancouver at **DB Bistro Moderne** and **Lumière**. Another three-Michelin starred internationally acclaimed New York chef making his Canadian debut is Jean-Georges Vongerichten, who brings his talents to the **Market by Jean-Georges** at the Shangri-La Hotel. Also flying the flag for hotel restaurants is **Griffins** at the Fairmont, which garners awards on an annual basis and serves breakfast, lunch and dinner. For seafood, try **Coast**, in the heart of downtown, and for a classic oldfashioned seafood and chop house, book into the legendary **Joe Fortes** — an award-winning restaurant for 25 years and reputedly Vancouver's best oyster bar. You'll find it just off Robson Street. Alternatively, Yaletown has more than 60 restaurants to tempt every taste.

DRINK... Subeez is great for breakfast, lunch, dinner, brunch, cocktails and beers, while the **900 West Lounge** at the Fairmont Hotel is known for its perfect dry vodka martini, jazz →

"And, of course, no visit to the islands would be complete without sinking a Painkiller cocktail at Jost Van Dyke's wonderfully named Soggy Dollar Bar."

AMALFI COAST, ITALY

"For me, the beauty and tranquillity of the Amalfi Coast makes it the ideal cruising destination. The combination of old-world charm and Italy's appreciation of the finer things in life mean you can experience a little bit of everything: culture, fantastic cuisine and stunning landscapes. I recommend spending a few days cruising to the islands of Ischia and Capri. Visit the boutiques and restaurants around the small fishing village of San Angelo on Ischia, or unwind in the thermal spas of this volcanic region. The fashionable island of Capri is just a short cruise from Ischia. Take the small train to the beautiful hilltop village of Anacapri, crowded with chic boutiques, restaurants and bars. Back on the mainland, the famous coastal towns of Positano, Sorrento and Ravello offer their fair share of attractions. Anchor off Positano, a charming hilly town with a great harbour for watersports. Further south, step ashore at the colourful town of Amalfi and explore the Amalfi Cathedral, or venture further inland to the ruins of Pompeii.

"From the Amalfi Coast, take an overnight cruise to the Aeolian Islands and Sicily for an extended itinerary."

"As far as I'm concerned, the style and glamour of the French Riviera is what yachting is all about. There is simply no better way to enjoy this alluring coastline than from the decks of a superyacht. The stretch of coastline from St Tropez to Monaco has it all. Anchor off Pampelonne Beach and take the tender ashore for a long, lazy lunch at Club 55, stroll along the designer boutiques that line the stylish Croisette in Cannes, and enjoy yourself at the casinos and bars of Monaco. For the ultimate gastronomic experience, I always recommend that clients head to Alain Ducasse's three-Michelin-starred Louis XV restaurant at the Hôtel de Paris in Monaco.

"Aside from its glitz, the Côte d'Azur is the perfect place to wander around markets, mountain-bike across hills, and linger in quaint cafés. If time allows, include Portofino, Italy, on your itinerary. The approach to this protected port is magical. Step ashore in the late afternoon and relax on the balcony of the Hotel Splendido. As the sun sets, take in the sights of this idyllic port, which will include your yacht — it is just about the best view imaginable."

rtistic heritage, mythical wonder and enchanting culture have become irrevocably entwined with the archipelagos of Greece. All are suffused with intrigue, adorned with whitewashed houses and beautiful beaches, and lapped by the constant wash of the sea. But as the archipelagos are so vast, you ideally need to single out just one group to explore during each visit.

One of the most popular is the Ionian island chain, located off the northwest coast of mainland Greece. Once home to legendary Greek king — and pioneering island-hopper — Odysseus, these islands deliver mythic grandeur in spades, with plenty of secluded beaches and hidden coves for you to create a remarkable journey of your own. The seven Ionian islands run from the basin of the Adriatic to the Peloponnese. The archipelago encapsulates the beauty of the Greek countryside and, thanks to its proximity to Italy, combines this with a distinct Venetian flavour. These are the most verdant islands in the region — Cyprus trees, firs and olives are kept green by the winter rainfall, while the summer's blue skies and stiff afternoon breezes enhance some of the best sailing waters in the Mediterranean. From the bustling fishing harbours of Corfu and Zakinthos to the tranquil fishing villages of Ithaca and Levkas, island hop and discover secluded beaches, welcoming locals and some fascinating architectural and archaeological sites.

The ideal place to begin your Ionian cruise is Corfu. The most northern island in this archipelago, it has a history rich with →

In order to preserve the underwater archaeology, independent diving is forbidden off the coasts of all the islands. If you wish to explore Greece's underwater world, your CNI charter broker can recommend a number of reliable diving schools.

Corfu town is relatively cosmopolitan and a great place to sit at a taverna and observe the passing scenes, while the island's coastline has stunning coves to lure travellers wishing to escape the crowded resort beaches. But it is the interior of the island that reveals Corfu's true character. Lush vegetation, rural villages and farms and countless olive and fruit trees abound. South of Corfu town, sample fantastic mezze at Taverna Nikolas on Agni Beach, or join the yachting crowd at the favourite waterfront haunt of Mitsos Taverna in Nissaki.

Later, set sail for the buzzing beaches and quiet coves of Paxos, taking in the imposing Emiritis Cliffs that drop dramatically to the sea along the northwest coast of Paxos. The island, which spans just seven by two miles, combines picturesque simplicity with an easy pace of life. Olive and cypress-clad hills gently slope into a crystal-clear sea, and dotted along these shores are small coves and bays and the three main harbours — Gaios, Loggos and Lakka. Lying just off the island's south coast is a tiny islet called Anti Paxos. Endowed with a multitude of green vegetation, it has two

beautiful beaches — Vrika and Voutoumi — at its north end. The islet is a haven for watersports enthusiasts. Spend the afternoon anchored in one of the many secluded coves before cruising on to Levkas.

Here you can wander through wooded hills and along high cliffs and spot an abundance of wildlife. The island is a paradise for windsurfers, sailors and beach lovers. Reliable winds in the south of the island at Vassiliki provide some of the best windsurfing conditions in Europe, while the deep coves and turquoise-coloured bays of Meganissi, the largest islet in the southern part of the island, are ideal for watersports. To the east of Levkas, an archipelago of islets provides idyllic anchorages. During the evening, step ashore to Levkas Town where the streets have a hip atmosphere, particularly during the International Arts Festival in August.

From Levkas, it is an easy cruise to Homer's Ithaca. For centuries this quintessential Greek island has been synonymous with a hero of epic proportions: Odysseus. Virgin green hillsides tumble to a string of deserted coves with white, pebbly beaches, some of which can only be reached by sea and which provide an ideal secluded anchorage. Explore the Cave of the Nymphs, where Odysseus is said to have hidden gifts, the fountain of Arethusa, and Odysseus' palace. Serious nightlife on Ithaca is non-existent, but the bijou ports are a showcase of charming Greek cafés and tavernas.

For the St Tropez of the Ionian, hop over to Cephalonia's northernmost port, Fiskardo. Spared by the earthquake that almost destroyed the whole island in 1953, this intimate \rightarrow



harbour is a magnet for superyachts, yet even in high season it never feels crowded. You'll find plenty of restaurants here, including the quintessentially Greek Nicholas Taverna, and Tassia, which serves traditional Ionian dishes including spicy beef or veal sofrito, spicy fish bourdetto and, closer to home,

Next cruise south to Myrtos beach, with its white and azure waters and sheer cliffs making it one of the most photographed beaches in the world — particularly as it is one of the island's beaches that appeared in the film *Captain Corelli's Mandolin*. Geologists among your party will be keen to visit the Drogarati and Melissani caves. The latter date back more than 30,000 years and some of the existing stalactites have been classed as being around 20,000 years old. Watch the subterranean lake transform into a stunning myriad of colours as the sun strikes through the small opening in the cave's roof.

Finally, sail to the furthest island in the Ionian chain, Zakinthos. Rich with vineyards, orchards, olive groves, beaches and azure waters, the island is known as the 'Flower of the Levant' by the Venetians, who ruled here for almost 350 years. Relax in the therapeutic sulphur springs around Keri before strolling along the shorefront of Zakinthos Town at sunset.

BEYOND THE IONIAN...

If you' ve already cruised the Ionian, rest assured there are countless other islands to explore. The most popular group is the Cyclades, made up of 39 islands that form a circle around the sacred island of Delos. Abounding with an astonishing wealth of historical sites and legacies, gleaming white villages and blue church domes stacked above the sea, the chain lends Greece its most potent charm.

The lesser-known Saronic islands, meanwhile, are the closest group to Athens and are, in the main, a laid-back affair, while the Sporades, to the northeast, are mostly uninhabited and are blessed with numerous deserted beaches. The rocky Dodecanese islands are closer to the coastline of Turkey, and therefore best combined with a Turkish itinerary.

f you are looking to add a dose of healthy living to your charter, there are several ways to maximise wellbeing while on board a superyacht. Whether you are looking for occasional pampering spa treatments or a complete change of lifestyle, experts are on hand to deliver everything from the ultimate spa experience to fitness training and nutritional advice. You can either bring on board your own personal dieticians, fitness trainers and therapists for all, or part, of your charter, or you can step ashore to experience treatments at destination spas in your charter area.

FITNESS FACILITIES

A superyacht can be a private arena for all manner of fitness activities. The ocean is an endless source of activity, be it swimming, diving, snorkelling or water sports, and even the motion of a yacht can tone muscles and improve core balance the entire time you are on board. Then there are the spacious, view-blessed decks that lend themselves to a session of yoga or Pilates. Depending on your location, yoga and a range of outdoor activities can also be arranged on the beach.

Furthermore, many yachts are now equipped with gyms that feature as many types of equipment as might be found in your gym at home, including fixed resistance machines. Several of the larger yachts have qualified personal trainers among their crew, or you could bring your own personal trainer. Bear in mind, however, that this option is only realistic on board one of the larger superyachts where spacious accommodation enables a team to accompany you.

James Duigan (see page 96) is a world-renowed personal trainer who works with the likes of international model and businesswoman Elle Macpherson, and Victoria Secret's model and actress Rosie Huntington-Whiteley. Duigan calls his personal training philosophy 'Bodyism', and the results speak for themselves. Duigan regularly accompanies his clients on board their yachts to maintain their training regime. "For many people, a holiday is a unique window of opportunity to kick start a healthy lifestyle away from the demands and pressures of their working life," James explains. "Every client is unique and my programmes are tailored to individual needs. Of course, on a superyacht daily fitness activities will depend on location and itinerary but may include running on the beach, hiking in the mountains, circuit training on board or on the beach, and swimming in the sea, interspersed with yoga or Pilates sessions."

NUTRITIONAL SUPPORT

Your chef can discuss nutritional requirements with you or your trainer and can tailor your meals to complement a healthy lifestyle. You can still enjoy gourmet treats, and it's always up to you to decide what, and how much, you want. If you decide to take your health to another level, your chef can support a detox diet (which, despite eliminating cream, sugar, butter and salt, still tastes delicious) and can demonstrate how to prepare appetising meals and provide alternative suggestions for your diet once you return home.

WELLBEING TREATMENTS

The ocean is one of nature's most restful environments, easily inspiring relaxation and reflection. To optimise this, several superyachts in the CNI fleet have their own dedicated spa areas (see page 26). Other yachts have cabins that can be transformed into relaxing venues for daily massages and beauty treatments.

For ultimate on-board pampering, many clients opt for regular massage therapies during their charter. Massage has a deeper effect than simply relaxing the muscles — scientists have shown it also reduces the stress hormone cortisol and increases the anti-pain hormone serotonin. A handful of superyachts have crew members that are trained as massage and beauty therapists, but your CNI charter broker can also arrange for specialists to come on board during your cruise. Heather Hawthorne is one such example, travelling the world as a spa therapist-inresidence. "A yachting holiday is the perfect time to relax and focus on your health and wellbeing," confirms Heather. "Spa treatments tend to enhance relaxation and personal enjoyment more than any other activity on board."

Hawthorne tailors holistic and therapeutic treatments around your charter itinerary. As a guideline, she suggests incorporating daily massages — either in your stateroom, on deck or on the beach — with wraps and facials.





The lemons provide vitamin C and potassium and help dissolve waste, the cayenne stimulates circulation and speeds the cleansing and elimination process, and ginger is known for its gastrointestinal benefits. The syrup itself is the highest quality organic palm syrup and is abundant in minerals, particularly potassium, and is perfectly balanced with sodium so your body (in the absence of food) still gets the nutrients it needs. If you'd rather not go to such extreme measures, opt for the 'relaxed' version where you're allowed to tuck into a healthy lunchtime meal.

DOUBLE IMPACT

The twin-island nation of New Zealand is made for active adventure, and with the Rugby World Cup being hosted there later this year, it is the perfect place to head for a fun-fuelled charter

he Rugby World Cup will certainly put New Zealand in the spotlight this year, but there is so much more to this twin-island country. If you're planning to catch the action on the touch-line, tie it in with a charter around this spectacular part of the world. Whether drifting across a secluded bay or inlet, exploring the many uninhabited islands, or sailing into its many harbours, New Zealand has endless cruising possibilities. If you set aside enough time, a charter can take in both North and South islands, with stops in the Bay of Islands, the Marlborough Sounds, Tauranga and, of course, the Rugby World Cup venues themselves: Auckland and Wellington. Sadly, the devastating earthquake that hit Christchurch in February caused such critical damage that Rugby New Zealand 2011 has decided to reschedule the city's matches at Eden Park, Auckland. However, Christchurch, often referred to as the Garden City of New Zealand, remains a key region to visit on a charter of South Island.

Although the less populated of the two, South Island's scenery alone makes it worthy of a visit. It offers a varied landscape of snowy peaks that sit above sun-drenched plains, waterfalls, fjords and lakes and vineyards, the most famous of which are in Marlborough Wine Country. Although the first vineyards here only gained a reputation in the early 70s, the region is now

regarded as being one of the world's finest producers of Sauvignon Blanc. Another must-visit city is Queenstown. New Zealand's adrenaline capital, this year-round Alpine resort on the shores of a vast lake offers every opportunity for a healthy, active holiday.

North Island is altogether different. Its stunning landscape comprises pristine lakes and is home to some of the southern hemisphere's most cosmopolitan cities, including Auckland, aka the 'City of Sails'. The largest Polynesian city in the world, it offers a wide range of shops and restaurants, busy

ACTIVE CHARTERS

Both New Zealand's North and South islands offer a wealth of opportunities, ranging from remote trekking to whale-watching. Here are just a few activities to keep you moving during a charter through the southern hemisphere...

SCUBA DIVE AROUND THE POOR KNIGHTS

Lying off the northeast coast of North Island, the Poor Knights nature and marine reserve is home to one of the best diving spots in the world. Tropical currents sweep through attracting a variety of tropical species that cannot be found anywhere else in New Zealand.

Swim with sharks

Come face to face with Mako and Blue sharks (albeit from behind the bars of a protective metal cage) in the waters just north of Gisborne, North Island.

WALK THE SKY TOWER

Make your way around the thin perimeter ring of one of the Southern Hemisphere's tallest freestanding structures. At 192m (630') above ground, the famous Sky Tower promises spectacular views of Auckland and your yacht berthed below. The fact that you have no handrails and nothing but sky on either side of you makes for a nail-biting experience. Although you'll be fitted with a full body harness and overhead safety lines, this is not recommended for the faint of heart.

SEA KAYAK IN ABEL TASMAN NATIONAL PARK

Lying at the northern tip of New Zealand's South Island, the Abel Tasman coast is renowned for clear azure waters, white-sand beaches, hidden coves and spectacular headlands. Here you can paddle your way among seal pups and dolphins, Little Blue Penguins, and many other sea birds that make a home along this beautifully preserved coastline. Sea kayaking is also popular in the Bay of Islands, Hauraki Gulf and Milford Sound.

GO WILD IN QUEENSTOWN


In Queenstown you will find plenty of daredevil opportunities for even the most adventurous among you. From skydiving and bungee jumping to skiing, hand-gliding and quad biking, the city provides every adrenalin-pumping activity imaginable.

WHITE-WATER RAFTING AND JET BOATING

North Island is home to the Wairoa, Mohaka and Kaituna rivers, all of which provide challenging rapids for white-water rafting, while South Island has action on the Shotover, Kawarau and Rangitata rivers. For an extra adrenalin rush, jet boating is available along most of the major rivers on South Island.

WHALE-WATCHING IN KAIKOURA

North of Christchurch, Kaikoura has a deep underwater canyon with unusual sea currents that attract an abundance of marine life — the most famous being the sperm whales, which are drawn by the region's rich plankton. The waters here also abound with dolphins.





SAMPLE ITINERARY

CHRISTCHURCH TO WELLINGTON (160 NAUTICAL MILES)

From Christchurch, cruise up the coastline of South Island to Wellington. Pass a landscape of spectacular views along the snow-capped Kaikoura Mountain Range and look out for schools of dolphins and the giant sperm whales that migrate to feed in the waters off the coast of Kaikoura.

WELLINGTON, NORTH ISLAND

Cruise through the narrow passage by Barrett Reef into Wellington Harbour and step ashore to the city that has reinvented itself as a mecca for gourmands. Here you will find more bars, restaurants and cafés per head than in New York.

WELLINGTON TO NAPIER (196 NAUTICAL MILES)

Depart late afternoon and watch the sun set behind the snow-capped Mount Tapuae-O-Uenuku at the top of South Island. Cruise up the Wairarapa Coast to Napier.

NAPIER TO TAURANGA (220 NAUTICAL MILES)

Cruise up the Hawke's Bay coastline and pass the Mahia Peninsula and Poverty Bay, before rounding the East Cape and White Island. Cruise on until you can step ashore in Tauranga and walk to Mount Maunganui and the town boasting a famous café culture and white-sand beaches. Alternatively, the thermal wonderland of Rotorua, a centre for Maori culture, is just an hour's drive away.

TAURANGA TO AUCKLAND (130 NAUTICAL MILES)

Set between two harbours, Auckland is the ideal gateway to the nearby Hauraki Gulf and Bay of Plenty. The sheltered waters are ideal for yachting and recreational fishing and the area has long been a great venue for yachting regattas, such as the America's Cup. Cruise slowly past the Whangaparaoa Peninsula, Kawau Island, Little Barrier Island, Great Barrier Island, and the Poor Knights Islands — famous for diving and fishing.

harbours and beautiful beaches. From here, it is just a short cruise to the Bay of Plenty with its long stretches of beach and secluded bays. To the north of the island, the aptly named Northland reflects a strong Maori heritage and is home to numerous sites of historical interest.

There may be fewer sailing superyachts than motoryachts, but their appeal is undeniable. Thanks to their greener credentials and racing potential, they will remain a popular choice for a long time to come

ailing yachts have many attributes to recommend them, but for true fans the real clincher is that, unlike motoryachts, they can race. Cutting-edge technology and today's impressive building and design expertise mean that the new generation of sailing yachts are increasingly efficient and fast, a sure draw for the competitive owner. What is more, there are ever-more opportunities to push them to the limit. Superyacht sailing regattas are constantly gaining popularity, throwing participants right in the heart of the action. The St Barth's Bucket, now in its 25th year, attracted a record 38 entries for its 2011 regatta, with the number of entrants applying climbing year on year. Other events on the racing calendar include the Superyacht Cup and the Loro Piano Superyacht Regatta, both celebrating the camaraderie and spirit for which the sailing yacht community is famous. But before you launch into the world of regattas, you need to find the ultimate sailing yacht.

Design — classic versus modern

Motoryacht design concepts tend to monopolise the market, but there are more than enough impressive sailing yacht concepts available to those who do their research. The pendulum of current designs swings between classic and modern.



To own a J-Class is to be a part of an historic and elite group. As such these yachts, first constructed in the 1930s, have seen a particularly healthy resurgence in popularity. In 2010, Dutch yard Claasen Jachtbouw delivered the 43.4m (142') H1 Lionheart bringing the total number of J-Class originals and replicas in existence to six. Holland Jachtbouw also has two further designs under construction, the 40m (131') JH2 Rainbow and the 39m (128') JH3 Yankee, both of which are due in 2012, while Claasen Jachtbouw is working on the 42.6m (140') J7 Atlantis. Plans have also been approved to rebuild a further two designs, the 41.5m (136') S1 Svea and the 36.8m (121') J1 Enterprise. A special 2012 J-Class Regatta series will coincide with the Olympics, allowing the Js to stretch their legs in English waters, in Falmouth and around the Isle of Wight.

Drawing on the legacy of the Js, Humphrey's Yacht Design recently revealed the Tempus Class 150 ketch design. Commissioned by the owner of Turkish yard Arkin Pruva Yachts, the Tempus 150 is inspired by the hulls of the classic J-Class yachts, but with its design developed to enable it to function as a modern charter and cruising yacht. Designer Rob Humphreys describes the resulting concept as "closely resembling its forebears but developed in a number of →

ways to make it more applicable to modern lifestyle." In a similar style, the Countess design from Studio Delta is a 39m (128') concept, based on the traditional hull of the 69m (226') schooner Atlantic. Like the Tempus Class 150, Countess' rigging, interior and exterior have been designed to reflect a traditional 1930s yacht, but will incorporate modern systems to ensure high levels of comfort on board. For example, climate control is specified throughout all guest and crew spaces. If she is built, Countess will function as a fully certified charter yacht.

As well as the more classic styles being brought to the table, increasing modernity, and even an element of the space age, is being seen in some of today's designs. Recent concepts presented to the market include Phoenicia by Igor Lobanov and Ankida by Lila-Lou.

Igor Lobanov presented Phoenicia to the market this year and describes the project as being explorative. The unusual shape of the bow was inspired by ancient royal ships, and a key feature of it is the all-around deck with a pattern incorporated into its structure. The model is based on a 100m-plus (328') sailing yacht, with particular emphasis placed on a spacious aft deck, which houses a heli-pad.

In developing the 73m (240') Ankida concept, London-based studio Lila-Lou integrated the mast, sail and keel configuration with the hull and superstructure. Her sail has been designed to allow the greatest surface area coverage and optimal positioning in relation to the wind. Each mast has a boom running parallel to one another so they have the ability to slide forward and aft, a feat achieved by designing each boom in two sections. The sails can then be offset from one another when on a beat or reach, maximising the sail area for the conditions. She also features a magnetically levitated wind turbine that supplies power for the yacht's operation and general services.

In build

The aforementioned concepts all hint at the sort of designs we can look forward to in the future, but it is the models that are already under construction at yards that are keeping sailing yacht enthusiasts champing at the bit.

There are many names synonymous with sailing yacht builds across the world: Royal Huisman, Dubois, Perini Navi, Alloy Yachts and Vitters, to list just a handful. Sailing yachts are created by experts who live and breathe their design and construction, sharing the great passion possessed by the owners of these vessels, and always endeavouring to break new ground with their designs. A sailing superyacht is a very different breed of vessel to a motoryacht as it is required to function under both power and sail and, in many cases, perform in racing conditions while still providing a comfortable and luxurious home for guests.



Responses to changing trends, technologies and demands from owners have seen increasingly innovative and beautiful yachts being built. One notable trend over the last decade is the popularity of large sailing yachts. Launches in 2010 included six sailing yachts greater than 50m (164') in length, while the average length of sailing yachts launched the same year was 39.7m (130').

The longest sailing superyacht in the world is currently the 92.9m (305') Eos, built by Lürssen in 2006, closely followed by the 90m (295') Athena, built by Royal Huisman in 2004, and the 88m (288') Maltese Falcon, built by Perini Navi in 2006. All three will be significantly trumped in length, however, by the 141m (463') all-wood schooner, Dream Symphony, which was recently given the green light for construction by Turkish yard Dream Ship Victory. Work on the yacht begins this year and she is due to be delivered in 2016.

Dream Symphony's naval architecture is by Dykstra & Partners and her exterior by Ken Freivokh Design. Considering the vast quantities of wood that will be required for her construction, it is fortunate that Dykstra & Partners have pledged to use a unique technology using tropical wood sourced from renewable forests.

Another 'biggest-ever' will be delivered in the form of the voluminous 44.2m (145') catamaran Hemisphere, which is being completed at British yard Pendennis. Upon her launch

in 2011, she will take the title of largest cruising catamaran in the world.

Continuing the theme of sailing yachts with large LOAs, in March this year Alloy Yachts launched the 67.2m (220') Vertigo, designed by Philippe Briand with an 'urban at sea' interior by Cristian Liagre. She is not just the largest yacht built by the yard, but also the biggest luxury sailing yacht to be constructed in the Southern Hemisphere.

Two other sailing yachts over 6om (197') making an appearance this year are the 66m (217') Dubois-designed sloop (unnamed at time of going to press) from Vitters, which launched in March, and the 66m ketch Panamax from Baltic Yachts.

The yachts being delivered now are, of course, those that were ordered before and on the brink of the recession. As some owners are now opting for more modest investments in today's market, some decrease in the size of yachts is to be expected in the future. However, despite the recent economic downturn, which had a profound effect on the superyacht market, sailing yachts are continuing to hold their own on the order books. Maintaining its enduring appeal, the sailing yacht market seems set to continue sailing forth into exciting new territories.

super sailing yachts PLAIN SAILING he superyacht brokerage market currently has 127 sailing yachts over 30m (98') available for sale. At the time of going to press, the distribution between motoryachts and sailing yachts was an 80/20 split — to be precise, 81% motoryachts and 19% sailing yachts. The last few years have reflected no significant difference in this balance, despite relatively better business performance from new sailing yachts, possibly as a result of growing environmental concerns spreading throughout the world and the industry.

Ten per cent of the sailing yachts over 30m (98') on the market were built in 2010; 54% were built between 2000 and 2009; and the remainder in 1999 or before. Twenty four are priced in dollars, while 103 are priced in euros or sterling, showing that the sailing-yacht market remains predominantly European.

Over the past few years, sailing yachts have, on average, accounted for just over 10% volume of all brokerage deals. Compared with the business generated by sales of motoryachts, sailing yachts account for just over 10% of the value of all deals and this has remained consistent for the last few years. In 2010, 22 sailing yachts were sold, with CNI being involved in a number of these sales.



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

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

What essential items do you take when you travel...
